DB Avery Young recorded his 20th career pass defended with an interception last week. The safety has posted 50 tackles with a forced fumble in 2021. He ranks second on the defense with 38 collegiate starts.

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NOTABLE

- Rutgers is back on the road for the third time in four games with a trip to Indiana.
- Rutgers is 5-3 on the road since 2020.
- Rutgers is 4-0 this season when committing no turnovers and when permitting less than 20 points. The Scarlet Knights last had four games in a season with no turnovers in 2009 (five games).
- Rutgers ranks first nationally in net punt (46.0) and 13th in third down defense (31.4 percent).
- LS Billy Taylor and DL Julius Turner hold the program record with 54 career games played.
- Head coach Greg Schiano is second in program history with 75 wins leading the Scarlet Knights. Frank Burns holds the record (78).

VERSUS INDIANA

- Saturday will mark the eighth meeting on the gridiron between Rutgers and Indiana since first playing in 2014. The Scarlet Knights won the first two matchups, while the Hoosiers have taken the last five.

- Rutgers won the first game in 2014 by the score of 45-23, its largest margin of victory over a Big Ten opponent since joining the conference.

- In the 2015 meeting in Bloomington, Rutgers tied its school record with a 25-point comeback in a 55-52 victory that featured 1,223 combined yards of total offense. The 55 points are the most scored by Rutgers in a Big Ten game since joining the conference. Rutgers rallied for 28 unanswered points to end the game, as Kyle Federico hit a 26-yard field as time expired.

- Last year at SHI Stadium, Rutgers made it a 23-15 game in the third quarter, but No. 17 Indiana responded with a pair of touchdowns to take a 37-21 victory. WR Bo Melton had his first career multi-score game. Defensively, LB Olakunle Fatukasi notched 14 tackles with 2.5 for loss.

LAST TIME OUT

- DB Avery Young hauled in an interception on the opening series, but Wisconsin answered with one of their own and scored a touchdown. The Badgers, ranked No. 21 in the College Football Playoff poll, added 24 points in the second quarter on the way to a 52-3 win.

ILLINOIS WIN

- Down 14-10 at halftime, Rutgers held Illinois off the scoreboard in the second half and QB Noah Vedral scored a 15-yard rushing touchdown to put the Scarlet Knights ahead with 14:16 left in the fourth quarter in a 20-14 win. The defense allowed just 81 yards and three first downs in the second half.

- The go-ahead drive spanned 88 yards on 13 plays, including a fourth-down conversion by QB Gavin Wimsatt on a 13-yard pass to WR Bo Melton.

- PK Valentino Ambrosio tacked on a field goal to increase the lead to six. Illinois drove down to the Rutgers 35-yard line, but DB Kessawn Abraham picked up a tackle-for-loss on fourth down to thwart the drive.

- RB Kyle Monangai scored the first touchdown of the game on a 7-yard carry in the first quarter. RB Isaih Pacheco registered a game-high 91 rushing yards. Rutgers rushed for 230 yards, improving to 29-2 under head coach Greg Schiano when reaching 200 rushing yards in a game.

- Rutgers won a game for the 13th time under Schiano when trailing in the fourth quarter.

- After the Illini rushed for 357 yards the previous week at then-No. 7 Penn State, Rutgers' defense held Illinois to just 107 yards, including seven attempts for no gain or a loss. The Scarlet Knights allowed only 10 first downs, the least amount in a Big Ten game, also done in 2016 versus Illinois.

- Rutgers played its third game in 2021 with no turnovers surrendered and no sacks allowed.

• In the last nine seasons under Schiano, Rutgers improved to 10-5 coming off an open week.

AT MICHIGAN

- Down 20-3 at halftime, Rutgers rallied in the second half to make it a one-score game, but came up short in its Big Ten opener at No. 19 Michigan, 20-13.
- The Scarlet Knights' defense forced four-straight three-and-outs to start the second half, allowing just 42 yards (35 rushing, seven passing) and two first downs after halftime. Overall, Rutgers held the nation's leading rushing team (350.3 yards per game entering) to 112 yards on the ground, including only 48 after the first drive. The unit also stopped the Wolverines on each of the last seven third downs.
- QB Noah Vedral connected for a 14-yard touchdown to RB Aaron Young to cap a 91-yard drive, while PK Valentino Ambrosio connected for two field goals. RB Isaih Pacheco rushed for a game-high 107 yards, his seventh career game in triple figures.
- The 106,943 fans in attendance at Michigan Stadium marked the fourth-largest crowd to watch a Rutgers game, as the road tilt broadcast in front of a national audience on ABC.

DELAWARE WIN

- Rutgers scored touchdowns on four of its first five offensive drives to run away from Delaware in a 45-13 win. It was the first meeting between the Scarlet Knights and Blue Hens since 1973. RU improved to 3-0 for the first time since 2012.
- Rutgers advanced to 43-19 in non-conference games under Schiano, having won 20 of the last 23. That includes a 26-10 mark at home and winners of 12 of the last 14.
- Rutgers finished non-conference play in the regular season with a 3-0 mark. The last season with a perfect non-conference slate in the regular season was 2014.

- Rutgers scored at least 40 points in each of its first two home games for the third time in program history (1915, 1949).
- QB Noah Vedral topped 300 passing yards for the second time in his career with 323 yards on a 21-for-26 day. That included seven pass plays of at least 20 yards, including a 28-yard passing touchdown to WR Bo Melton and a 62-yarder to WR Brandon Sanders. RB Isaih Pacheco added two scores on the ground, with RB Aaron Young also punching one in from six yards out.
- WR Aron Cruickshank scored his first career punt return touchdown from 62 yards out. The runback earned Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week. It was also the 56th non-offensive touchdown for the Scarlet Knights under Schiano and fifth since 2020.
- Rutgers went 10-for-14 on third down, tied for the third-best percentage (71.4) in a game under Schiano.
- DL Aaron Lewis and DL Julius Turner each had 1.5 sacks, with the defense posting nine tackles-for-loss, holding UD to 98 passing yards and 3-for-13 on third down.

SYRACUSE WIN

- Following a scoreless first half, RB Kyle Monangai rushed for an 11-yard touchdown in the third quarter to break the seal in capping a 13-play drive over 6:15. Syracuse answered with a touchdown, but Rutgers converted a fourth down later in the quarter to lead to a 30-yard scoring pass from QB Noah Vedral to TE Jovani Haskins to put the Scarlet Knights on top. The defense held SU to 31 yards in the fourth quarter, with PK Valentino Ambrosio tacking on a field goal to set a 17-7 final score. Rutgers improved to 2-0 for the first time since 2014.
- The Scarlet Knights won the turnover battle, 3-0. DB Avery Young forced a fumble in the red zone recovered by DB Max Melton, DL Mayan Ahanotu picked up a strip sack in a one-score game that was gathered by DL CJ Onyechi and Melton snagged an interception late to seal the win. Overall, the defense held the Orange to 14 first downs, 67 rushing yards, 2-for-14 on third down and collected six sacks. LB Olakunle Fatukasi notched a game-high 13 tackles.
- P Adam Korsak earned Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week after averaging 52.2 yards on six attempts with a net of 51.7. The Aussie pinned 5-of-6 inside the 20, had four attempts of at least 50 yards, including a 69-yarder that settled at the 1. Rutgers posted a net advantage of 28.3 yards in the punt game.
- Rutgers beat Syracuse for the seventh time in the last nine matchups and fourth in the last five inside the Carrier Dome. The Scarlet Knights won for the sixth time in the last eight games versus the Orange under Schiano.

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- To honor the 37 alumni and all those lost in the Sept. 11 attacks, Rutgers football wore special uniforms in remembrance. The jersey featured stripes in tribute to the first responders, while the helmet showed names of Rutgers alumni lost, including football letterwinner James Martello. "Never Forget" displayed on the helmet and down the sides of the jersey as well.

TEMPLE WIN

- Propelled by an early safety on a sack by LB Olakunle Fatukasi, Rutgers raced out to a 26-0 lead and tacked on to claim a 61-14 season-opening win over Temple. The Scarlet Knights scored at least 10 points in each quarter in a game for the first time since at Fresno State in 2013.
- Rutgers scored five different ways on 10 scores, a safety, a field goal, a rushing touchdown, a receiving touchdown and an interception return touchdown. The Scarlet Knights picked up six rushing touchdowns overall, the most in a game in the Schiano era.
- The 61 points marked the most for Rutgers in a season opener versus an FBS opponent. It was the most points against an FBS opponent overall since posting 63 versus Louisville in 2008. Also the largest margin of victory over an FBS opponent since the 2008 Louisville win.
- Rutgers won the turnover battle, 5-0, with three fumbles recovered and two interceptions, including a pick-six by DB Max Melton. The Scarlet Knights also had only one penalty against.
- Rutgers won the field position game by averaging starting at own 47 compared to Temple beginning at own 22.
- The attendance of 52,519 marked the ninth-largest in stadium history.

2020 REVIEW

- Rutgers matched the program high with three Big Ten victories last season, all on the road. The Scarlet Knights had three Big Ten road victories combined the previous six seasons. Two of the wins came when trailing at halftime, as the team only had two such comeback Big Ten wins previously since joining the conference in 2014.
- The Scarlet Knights had 14 players recognized in the All-Big Ten voting, the most for the program since joining the league. The previous high was eight total honorees in 2017. That included four on the top-three teams in 2020 after totaling six combined the previous six years in the Big Ten and two over the last four seasons.
- The Scarlet Knights were one of just two teams in the conference to play all nine of its scheduled games.

2020 VICTORIES

- At Maryland: In a game that featured seven lead changes, Rutgers rallied from a 24-21 deficit with 2:56 remaining with an 11-play drive over 61 yards that ended with PK Valentino Ambrosio hitting a 39-yard field goal to force overtime. After Ambrosio connected from 42 yards, the defense held Maryland without a first down on its series, with DL Mike Tverdob recording a sack on third down to force a 50-yard field goal attempt, which sailed wide left and set a 27-24 final score. Rutgers notched season highs with 13 tackles-for-loss and seven sacks, which set a team Big Ten record. Tverdob became the fourth player in program history to record at least three sacks in a game.
- At Purdue: Rutgers overcame a 23-13 half-time deficit by outscoring Purdue in the second half, 24-7, to claim a 37-30 victory in its first visit to Ross-Ade Stadium. The Scarlet Knights dominated time of possession in the second half with 21:57 of ball control. That included an 18-play drive lasting 9:38 from the third quarter into the fourth, the longest drive by

the Scarlet Knights by time since a 10:40 season-opening march versus Cincinnati in 2009. After a three-and-out capped by a tackle-for-loss by DL Mike Tverdob, RU converted two first downs on rushes by QB Johnny Langan to wipe off the final 5:26. Purdue took its last offensive snap with 6:09 remaining on the clock and ran only three plays in the fourth quarter, as RU possessed for 13:17 in the last period. Langan rushed for 95 yards, his second-most in a game, on 21 carries with nine first downs picked up on a ground. WR Aron Cruickshank ripped off a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the third quarter after Purdue scored to take a 30-20 lead. Defensively, Rutgers held Purdue to a season-low 237 passing yards after entering averaging 320.8 per game.

- At Michigan State: Rutgers put together a 75-yard touchdown drive on the first possession and forced a fumble on its first defensive play on the way to a wire-to-wire 38-27 win at Michigan State in the return of head coach Greg Schiano. The 11-point victory tied for the largest margin of win in a Big Ten road game (35-24 at Illinois in 2017). Rutgers collected seven takeaways (five fumble recoveries, two interceptions), the most for the team in a game since 2000, and held the Spartans to 50 rushing yards.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- Rutgers posted its highest GPA ever as a program during the spring 2020 semester.
- Rutgers had 11 student-athletes earn Big Ten Distinguished Scholar status last season for maintaining at least a 3.7 GPA. Seven return to the 2021 roster: QB Austin Albericci, LB Matt Gibney, TE Brandon Myers, LS Brendan Shank, LS Billy Taylor, DL Mike Tverdob and QB Noah Vedral (4.0 GPA).
- Rutgers saw 46 student-athletes earn a spot on the Fall 2020 Academic All-Big Ten list, its most since joining the conference. OFFENSE

- A native of Glen Ridge, New Jersey, Sean Glee-son is in his second season as offensive coordinator. Glee-son was one of 56 nominees for the 2020 Broyles Award, which annually honors the top assistant coach in college football, out of approximately 1,270 assistant coaches representing 127 Division I programs across the country.
- Rutgers has shown offensive statistical improvements the last two seasons compared to 2019.

- Rutgers allowed one or no sacks in 5-of-9 games, topping 300 yards of total offense in 6-of-9 games.
- Rutgers has gone for it on fourth down 29 times, the most in the Big Ten and sixth nationally. The Scarlet Knights have 12 conversions.
- Rutgers posted four passing plays of at least 20 yards in the win at Illinois. The season-high is seven such passing plays versus Delaware. The Scarlet Knights had five runs of at least 10 yards at Michigan. Against Michigan State, the offense added three passing plays of at least 25 yards and posted a 46-yard passing gain at Northwestern.
- Rutgers posted a program-best 26.7 points per game in a Big Ten season in 2020. The Scarlet Knights scored at least 20 points in eight games after reaching the mark five times the previous four seasons and 12 times in the first 52 Big Ten games. The 26.7 points per game ranked eighth in the Big Ten, improving from No. 14 the preceding season, as the previous best ranking in Big Ten-only games was 11th. The mark signaled the best production in Big Ten play since joining the league in 2014.
- Rutgers finished as the fourth-most improved team in the nation by scoring offense (+13.4 points per game). The Scarlet Knights scored 81 more points than in 2019 (playing three fewer games), the sixth-best improvement in the nation in total points scored (the five higher teams all played 12 games). In addition, RU was the most improved in the Big Ten total in touchdowns scored (+12) and offensive touchdowns (+9).
- Rutgers averaged over 300 yards per game (339.1) in a Big Ten season for the first time since 2015. The increase of 66 yards per game overall was the best improvement among Big Ten teams. The 3,052 yards of total offense was 1,172 more than the previous year in Big Ten play.

Quarterbacks

Johnny Langan

- Threw seventh career passing touchdown against Michigan State.
- Set career highs with 42 receiving yards on three receptions versus Delaware. Had a career-long 27-yard catch on a third down to extend eventual go-ahead drive in win at Illinois.
- Rushed for two touchdowns in the win over Temple.
- Led the offense with four rushing touchdowns and second with 201 rushing yards on 56 carries last season. Picked up 14 first downs.
- Rushed for nine first downs at Purdue while running for 95 yards on the ground, including 53 in the fourth quarter. Also completed all three passes with a 62-yard touchdown strike.
- Started eight games in 2019 and led the team with 1,231 yards of total offense. Accounted for seven touchdowns (four passing, three rushing).
- Rushed for 391 yards, the most by a Rutgers quarterback since Sam Mudie had 401 in 1961 and third-most by a Big Ten quarterback following the 2019 regular season. Rushed for a team-high 30 first downs.
- Rushed for 118 yards in the win over Liberty to become the first Rutgers quarterback to reach the century mark in a game since Sam Mudie (105) versus Lehigh in 1961. Named Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week after the performance.

- Recorded first rushing touchdown of the season and eighth career on a 15-yard carry to put team ahead in fourth quarter at Illinois. Has three games this year with at least 45 rushing yards.
- Ranks seventh in the Big Ten with 16 completions per game and seventh with 192.4 yards of total offense per game.
- Has 19 completions in 2021 of at least 20 yards.

- Selected Preseason All-America (*CBS Sports*, *Phil Steele*, Walter Camp) and to the watch list for the Hornung Award.
- Voted 2020 Big Ten Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year and First Team All-Big Ten by the coaches and media. Picked honorable mention All-America by *Phil Steele*.

- Led the nation with two kickoff return touchdowns as one of four players with multiple scores. Had a 98-yard touchdown versus Nebraska and a 100-yarder at Purdue. Ranked fourth nationally and first in the Big Ten with 671 combined kick return yards. Averaged 26.8 yards, second in the Big Ten, on 25 kickoff returns.
- Second on the team with 936 all-purpose yards with an average of 104 per game, 13th in the Big Ten, and five games in triple figures.
- Totaled 37 receptions for 239 yards and one touchdown. Had three games with at least seven catches. Recorded eight receptions for 84 yards versus Michigan, including first collegiate receiving score to help tie the game on a fourth down with 27 seconds remaining.

HEAD COACH GREG SCHIANO (13TH SEASON)



Greg Schiano, who previously led Rutgers to new heights from 2001-11, is in his second season back as the head football coach "On the Banks." The Wyckoff, New Jersey, native returned home to Piscataway on Dec. 3, 2019 and immediately made an impact on and off the field in 2020.

Schiano has directed the Scarlet Knights to six bowl appearances, coached 85 RU players who signed NFL contracts and guided the program to the top APR score in the nation so far during his time leading Rutgers football. The 2006 National Coach of the Year owns three nine-win campaigns and coached 17 Rutgers All-America selections, posting a 59-40 mark in his last eight seasons at the helm entering 2021. His 75 overall wins are second in school history with Harvey Harmon, behind Frank Burns (78).

"Rutgers University and this football program have meant the world to me and my family," Schiano said upon returning. "I arrived here in 2000 with the goal to build a program that would

be a source of pride for the state of New Jersey and develop great young men. I look forward to embracing that challenge once again. This is a great opportunity for all of Rutgers to pull together to get us back to where we all know we belong. It will take everyone on this campus and in the State of Rutgers to get this done."

The 2020 season presented unforeseen challenges dealing with the coronavirus pandemic. Playing a Big Ten-only schedule, the Scarlet Knights were one of just two teams in the conference to play all nine of its scheduled games. RU, despite missing spring and summer camp, matched the program high with three Big Ten victories, all away to equal the number of league road wins the previous six seasons combined. With a commitment to player and culture development, the Scarlet Knights had 14 players recognized in the All-Big Ten voting, the most for the program since joining the conference. That included four on the top-three teams, with wide receiver Aron Cruickshank, the Big Ten Rodgers-Dwight Return Specialist of the Year and honorable mention All-America pick by *Phil Steele*, and linebacker Olakunle Fatukasi both earning first-team honors. Rutgers posted a program-best 26.7 points per game in a Big Ten season, with eight games of at least 20 points after reaching the mark only five times in the prior four years. The 13.4 more points per game than 2019 marked the fourth-best improvement nationally following the regular season, while the scoring differential in Big Ten play was the best for the team by a margin of 8.6. The defense had at least one takeaway in 8-of-9 games with 19 overall, the most since 2012, and led the league with 7.8 tackles-for-loss per game.

Off the field, the Scarlet Knights launched #Chop4Change to spread a message of unity and equality amidst the national social justice discussion, while registering every student-athlete on the team to vote in the 2020 election. The initiative also involved giving back to the community through various forms. The program also achieved academic success with 46 student-athletes recognized on the Fall Academic All-Big Ten list, the most for the Scarlet Knights since joining the conference. The team posted its highest GPA ever as a program during the spring 2020 semester.

After making one prior trip to a bowl game in Rutgers football history, Schiano led the team to six bowls in the final seven seasons of his first stint, including the program's first bowl victory. The Scarlet Knights won the last five, which was the longest active streak in the nation following the 2011 season. In addition, RU was ranked in 20 weeks during Schiano's first tenure after appearing in the AP Poll only nine times prior.

Schiano first took over on Dec. 1, 2000. "This program will be built on a rock foundation," he said. "It will take longer than building it on stilts, but when it's built, it will be built forever. This is where I started; this is where I was striving to get back to. I'm thrilled to be here. It's time."

Building up the Scarlet Knights with three rejuvenating recruiting classes to start, Schiano put together an upset win over Syracuse to close 2003 before knocking off Michigan State to start 2004 in front of the largest crowd in Rutgers Stadium history at the time (42,612). The team broke through in 2005 with a 7-5 record, the first winning season since 1992, and a trip to the Insight Bowl for RU's first bowl appearance since 1978.

Moving to the memorable 2006 campaign, Rutgers went 11-2, earned the program's first national top-10 ranking (peaking at No. 7) and won a bowl championship with a convincing 37-10 victory over Kansas State in the Texas Bowl. "Pandemonium in Piscataway" was achieved with a 28-25 upset of No. 3 Louisville in front of a raucous home crowd and national television audience. It was the first triumph for the program over a top-25 opponent since 1988. Schiano collected the Eddie Robinson, Walter Camp, Home Depot and Liberty Mutual National Coach of the Year, as well as the Big East Coach of the Year following the season. The final national ranking of No. 12 still stands as the high-water mark in program history.

The momentum continued in 2007 with eight more wins, which included a 30-27 victory over No. 2 USF. The season was capped by running past Ball State, 52-30, in the International Bowl and set school records for scoring (426), first downs (294) and total offense (5,841). The 2008 campaign started 1-5, but the Scarlet Knights reeled off a six-game winning streak to become bowl eligible again and went on to beat NC State, 29-23, in the PapaJohns.com Bowl to finish with seven-straight in the win column. Then in 2009, RU beat a top-25 opponent for the fourth consecutive year and took down UCF, 45-24, in the St. Petersburg Bowl to finish off a 9-4 season.

In 2011, Rutgers had its third nine-win season under Schiano, tying Burns for the most in program history. The Scarlet Knights defeated Iowa State, 27-13, in the Pin-stripe Bowl for the fifth-straight bowl win.

Schiano coached the leading rusher, passer and receiver by yards in Rutgers football history, sending all to the NFL. Ray Rice finished with 4,926 rushing yards, 1,812 more than second place, with 49 touchdowns. He holds the top two spots on the RU single-game rushing leaderboard with a high of 280 in the 2008 International Bowl. Mike Teel was a three-year starting quarterback and is the only signal caller in school history to lead the Scarlet Knights to three bowl victories. Throwing for 9,398 yards overall, he still owns single-game school records for passing yards (447) and touchdowns (7) in Rutgers' 63-14 victory over Louisville in 2008. Britt was a primary target for Teel, recording 3,403 receiving yards. He once had five consecutive games with over 100 yards and totaled 14 such outings, both school standards.

Schiano also turned special teams in a game-changing force for the Scarlet Knights. RU has blocked 61 kicks during to rank among the nation's leaders, while scoring 56 defensive/special teams touchdowns, including three in 2020. Kicker Jeremy Ito shattered the school record with 80 career field goals and earned All-America status.

While producing victories at a rate unprecedented in the program's history, the Rutgers football team is also committed fully to succeeding in the classroom. In 2010, Rutgers ranked first in the nation in Academic Progress Rate. The team followed that up with the nation's No. 2 ranking in 2011. The program was the lone state university to be ranked in the top 10 percent nationally in APR during each of Schiano's last five seasons of his first term. Nate Jones became the program's first two-time CoSIDA Academic All-America selection (2002-03) and was a member of the National Football Foundation/College Football Hall of Fame National Scholar Class of 2003, one of just eight FBS players honored. In addition, Brandon Renkert earned CoSIDA Academic All-America status in 2007, while Brian Leonard received the prestigious Draddy Trophy, recognized as the "Academic Heisman," in 2006. The emphasis on academics continued in 2020 with a program-high 46 Academic All-Big Ten selections and the highest recorded GPA in team history during the spring 2020 semester.

Known as a tireless recruiter with the ability to spot talent and develop players, Schiano has mentored 85 Scarlet Knights who went on to sign NFL contracts. That includes first-round picks in Kenny Britt (2009), Anthony Davis (2010) and Devin McCourty (2010). Rutgers had never had a player taken in the first round before Britt went 30th overall to the Tennessee Titans. Davis' selection at No. 11 by the San Francisco 49ers marked the highest draftee in school history. McCourty, who went 27th to the New England Patriots, has won three rings in five trips to the Super Bowl. Eleven Scarlet Knights who played for Schiano at Rutgers entered the 2021 season active on the 90-man NFL roster (Michael Burton, Andrew DePaola, Michael Dwumfour, Duron Harmon, Clark Harris, Tyler Kroft, Devin McCourty, Jason McCourty, Logan Ryan, Mohamed Sanu and Brendon White).

Schiano accepted the head coach position for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in Jan. 2012 and spent two seasons at the helm of the NFL franchise.

Schiano returned to the sidelines as the associate head coach and defensive coordinator, also coaching safeties, at Ohio State in 2016. He coached 10 players who were NFL Draft picks, five of whom were first-round selections during his three seasons. There were three first-round picks from the secondary in the 2017 NFL Draft: Malik Hooker (Indianapolis), Gareon Conley (Oakland) and Marshon Lattimore (New Orleans). Hooker, a unanimous All-America pick in 2016, was first nationally with three "pick-sixes" and third nationally with seven interceptions that season. The Buckeyes went 36-5 in Schiano's three years as defensive coordinator and 24-3 against Big Ten opponents. That led to two Big Ten titles plus wins in the 2017 Cotton Bowl and 2019 Rose Bowl. In addition, OSU was No. 6 nationally in total defense under Schiano in 2016 when advancing to the College Football Playoff semifinals. The Buckeyes were one of just three programs to rank in the top 10 in total defense in both 2016 and 2017. Schiano was the No. 2 recruiter in the nation by *247Sports* and *CBSSports.com* for the 2018 signing class.

Schiano served as the defensive coordinator at Miami in 1999 and 2000 before becoming the Rutgers head coach. The Hurricanes posted a 20-5 record during that time, including 11-1, the No. 2 national ranking and a Sugar Bowl win in 2000. That defense finished fifth nationally in scoring defense (15.5) after ranking 12th in the category the year before (17.2). Following the 2000 season, linebacker Dan Morgan, who was the 11th overall pick in the NFL Draft, became the first player in college football history to win the Butkus Award (top linebacker), Nagurski Award (college defensive player of the year) and Bednarik Award (top defensive player) in the same year, in addition to being a consensus first-team All-America selection and the Big East Defensive Player of the Year. Strong safety Ed Reed was also a consensus first-team All-America honoree in 2000 and would later earn a spot in the both the College Football Hall of Fame and Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Prior to his assignment in Miami, Schiano spent three seasons in the NFL with the Chicago Bears (1996-98). The 1997 team placed first in the NFC in third-down defense (31.7 percent), while the 1996 squad climbed from 27th in the NFL to 11th in fewest yards allowed. Schiano was the defensive backfield coach at Penn State from 1991-95 after working as a graduate assistant in 1990. The Nittany Lions picked up 58 wins throughout those years and made six bowl appearances. The 1994 PSU team went 12-0 (8-0 Big Ten) and finished No. 2 in the national rankings after beating Oregon in the Rose Bowl. He previously was a graduate assistant at Rutgers in 1989, beginning his coaching career as an assistant at his alma mater, Ramapo High School the year before.
