SETTING THE SCENE

- Indiana is set to host Indiana State on Friday (Sept. 12) at 6:30 p.m. on Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium in Bloomington, Indiana.
- The matchup will mark the eighth ever meeting between the two programs and first since 2023, when they also played on a Friday night. The Hoosiers own a 7-0 advantage in the series history.
- The home contest marks the third of seven home games for the Hoosiers on Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium this season and the third of four in a row to begin the 2025 campaign.
- Indiana State moved to a 2-0 start for the first time since the 1986 season when it opened with wins over St. Cloud State and Missouri State.

NEWS & NOTES

- Indiana enters the game with a 2-0 record after a 56-9 win in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). The Hoosiers are 2-0 in back-to-back years for the first time since 2019-20.
- Friday's game will be the 12th Friday game in program history for the Hoosiers and the fourth consecutive season that Indiana has hosted one. Indiana owns a 6-5 record on Friday and has won three in a row (2022-24).
- Indiana Football is nationally ranked in the first three polls (counting preseason) for only the fourth time in the history of the AP poll (1944, 1945, 1968). Indiana has also been nationally ranked 15-straight weeks during the 2024 and 2025 seasons, the most weeks nationally ranked in any two seasons in program history.
- Curt Cignetti has the fourth-best winning percentage among active FBS head coaches with an .821 winning percentage in his career.

- Indiana's 313 yards rushing against Kennesaw State marked the third game of 300-plus rushing yards under Cignetti. It was also the first time that Indiana posted 300-plus rushing yards in back-to-back games since 2014 (363, North Texas; 316, at Iowa). *MORE ON PAGE 8*
- The 593 yards of total offense mark the seventh game of the Cignetti era with 500-plus yards of total offense. It is the second-most yards Indiana has gained under Cignetti.
- Fernando Mendoza threw a career-high four touchdown passes while recording an 18-for-25 passing day with 245 yards. He and **Alberto Mendoza** became the first set of brothers to throw a touchdown pass in the same game of the same team since 2015 when Arkansas' Brandon Allen and Austin Allen did so against UT Martin (10/31/2015). **MORE ON PAGE 7**
- **Elijah Sarratt** and **Roman Hemby** both carry impressive streaks of consecutive games with a reception. Sarratt leads the nation with 40-straight games with a catch while Hemby has notched 28-straight games with a reception to lead all running backs. **MORE ON PAGE 4**

PACKING & DEFENDING THE ROCK

In just his second year at the helm of the Indiana program, head coach Curt Cignetti has made Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium a daunting place for opposing teams to play.

The Hoosiers went 8-0 in their home games last season and as a program carry a program record 10-straight wins on Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium into Week 3 of the 2025 campaign.

Starting with the Nebraska game on Oct. 19, 2024 Indiana sold out its final four home contests of the 2024 season. The Nebraska sellout was the program's first since

In 2024, Indiana defeated seven of their eight home opponents by double digits and won on average by 35.5 points at home. Notable triumphs included a 77-3 victory against Western Illinois (Sep. 6), a 56-7 defeat of Nebraska (Oct. 19) and a 66-0 win over Purdue (Nov. 30).

The Hoosiers will play seven home games this season, including four in a row to begin the year.

RECEPTION COLLECTION

Elijah Sarratt and Roman Hemby are among college football's leaders in consecutive games with a reception.

Sarratt leads the the country with 40-consecutive games with a pass caught while Hemby leads the statistical category amongst all running backs with 28-straight games notching a reception.

GET OLD, STAY OLD

Since **Curt Cignetti** has took over as Indiana head coach, he has made it a priority to acquire players with vast experience and proven levels of production over potential.

The Hoosiers have 29 players on the roster this year that are in their final year of eligibility in 2025, which ties for the third-most of all FBS teams with Illinois and UAB. ONF-SCORE SOLIAD

Indiana head coach Curt Cignetti has compiled an impressive 132-37 record across his 15 years as a head coach, including stops at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (2011-16), Elon (2017-18) or James Madison (2019-23).

No matter if he was coaching in the Division II ranks, the FCS level or in the FBS, winning close games is a difference-making part of Cignetti's success with a 27-18 record in games decided by one score.

After going 6-9 in one-score games at IUP, Cignetti has a combined 21-9 record in one-score contests from 2017-24. He went 10-2 in such games at Elon and 10-7 while at James Madison. At Indiana, he's only coached in one game that came down to one score when the Hoosiers defeated Michigan, 20-15, on Nov. 9 last season.

Cignetti has never had a losing season as a head coach.

FAMILY RELINION

When redshirt junior quarterback Fernando Mendoza elected to transfer to Indiana after spending three years at California, he reunited with his brother and fellow quarterback, Alberto Mendoza, to become teammatees for the first time since 2022 when they attended Christopher Columbus High School in Miami together. They are the only active set of brothers to share the same quarterback room in FBS Foootball.

In the Week 2 win over Kennesaw State, they become the first set of brothers to throw a touchdown pass in the same game of the same team since 2015 when Arkansas' Brandon Allen and Austin Allen did so against UT Martin (10/31/2015).

FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

Indiana will play in a Friday night game for the fourth consecutive season in 2025. It will also be the first time that the Hoosiers play in two regular season Friday night contests in one season as Indiana will host Indiana State on Friday, September 12, at 6:30 p.m. and play at Purdue on Friday, November 28 at 7:30 p.m.

The two contests mark the 12th and 13th Friday games in program history.

The first Friday game at Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium came at noon in 1995 in a battle for the Old Oaken Bucket and was the only Friday game on IU's campus until 2022 versus Illinois.

The first non-Saturday contest in IU history was against border rival Kentucky on Thursday, November 30, 1893. The two teams played to a 24-24 tie in Lexington.

In all, Indiana holds an 12-6-1 mark in non-Saturday games in program history with a 6-5 mark on Fridays.

STAFF IIPNATE

After an outstanding 2024 season, Indiana head coach Curt Cignetti retained nearly the entire coaching staff from the previous campaign.

The only countable on-field assistant to leave was quarterbacks/co-offensive coordinator Tino Sunseri, who took the same position at UCLA.

Chandler Whitmer replaced Sunseri as the new head of the quarterbacks for Indiana in December 2024. Whitmer came to Bloomington after serving as a pass game specialist for the Atlanta Falcons in 2024.

Five of Cignetti's staff members were with him at James Madison, including: defensive coordinator/linebackers Bryant Haines, offensive coordinator/wide receivers Mike Shanahan, special teams coordinator/tight ends Grant Cain, defensive tackles Pat Kuntz and running backs John Miller.

BEEN AROUND THE BLOCK

There are 35 players in FBS Football that are on the seventh year or more of eligibility. Indiana running back Solomon Vanhorse is one of only three players on that list who are in their eighth year of college football. Vanhorse, Brandon Harris (MTSU) and David Reese (Syracuse) are all tied for the longest active tenured players in FBS football. Each member of the trio started their college football journey in the fall of 2018

Hoosier long snapper Mark Langston is one of the 32 seventh-year players in the sport. Indiana is one of eight schools on the list with at least two players and is tied with Minnesota for the most in the Big Ten. Colorado leads the entire country with three seventh year players. He spent one year at Village Christian High School in California and participated in basketball before he was selected as the No. 7 overall pick in the 2016 Australian Rules Football Rookie Draft by Collingwood and then trained with ProKick Australia in the fall of 2021.

THE BISON IS BACK

Indiana University's official mascot — Hoosier The Bison - has returned to the IU-Bloomington campus after a nearly 60-year hiatus. The mascot's homecoming is a result of the 'Bring Back the Bison Act' passed by the Indiana University Student Body Congress on Dec. 16, 2024. In response to the student government vote to readopt the Bison as the official IU-Bloomington mascot, IU Athletics moved forward with embracing it as a symbol of both the department and campus' spirit, passion, tradition, unity, and success.

Hoosier The Bison made its first public debut at the season opener against Old Dominion on Aug. 30 at Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium.

The state of Indiana and the bison have been linked for more than two centuries. The bison has been used as an Indiana symbol longer than Indiana has been a U.S. state. The bison first appeared on official court documents signed by then Indiana Territory Governor and future U.S. President William Henry Harrison in 1801, a full 15 years before Indiana became the country's 19th state in 1816. The Indiana Territory seal depicted a woodsman chopping trees while a bison runs in the foreground, symbolizing the country's expansion on the Indiana frontier (at the time, the western boundary of the United States). The bison has been a part of the Indiana state seal ever since.

At the recommendation of the IU Student Athletic Board and confirmed by the Indiana University Student Senate, the bison mascot was officially adopted and brought to life on October 14, 1965. While the original intent was to have a live bison, that never came to fruition, so the first bison mascot debuted just in time for the final home football game that year — the Old Oaken Bucket game on November 20, 1965.

The 1966 Indiana Football season featured a new costume that was focused on a more realistic look with a very large, authentic-looking bison head. This look lasted through the 1967 season before moving on to a costume more catered to the performer inside with an emphasis on an ease of mobility.

The new bison mascot costume debuted just in time for the January 1, 1968, Rose Bowl matchup with USC. The updated bison costume returned for the 1968 and 1969 seasons but student and fan support for the bison mascot began to wane and ultimately led to a long hiatus from the campus.

A NEW & HISTORIC PARTNERSHIP

Just over a week before the start of the 2025 season, Indiana announced that IU Athletics and Merchants Bank formed a new partnership in support of the University's Department of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The agreement includes a \$50 million commitment over 20 years. As part of the agreement with Indiana Athletics and Learfield's IU Sports Properties, Memorial Stadium's playing surface has been named renamed Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium, effectively immediately.

While the new branding is the biggest change that IU fans will see, what separates this agreement from many others is that it extends well beyond naming rights. An exciting part of the partnership for IU student-athletes — both present and future — is that Merchants Bank will provide them with comprehensive financial literacy training. This training will be at no cost to the student-athletes and will help ensure that they have the tools to maximize their opportunities in a new intercollegiate athletics landscape that includes, among other things, revenue sharing and NIL.

"Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium" will be prominently displayed in multiple locations on the stadium's playing surface. New interior, exterior and directional signage debuted during the team's Week 1 opener against Old Dominion (Aug. 30).

This is the first time in program history that Memorial Stadium's field will have

TWO HOOSIERS ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME BALLOT

A pair of Indiana All-Americans in running back *Vaughn Dunbar* (1990-91) and quarterback *Antwaan Randle El* (1998-2001) are on the ballot for the College Football Hall of Fame in 2025.

Randle El earned All-Big Ten distinction in 1999, 2000 and 2001, and was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1998. The Big Ten MVP, and first-team All-American in 2001, Randle El finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that season.

The Riverdale, Illinois, native was the first in NCAA history to score 40 career touchdowns (45) and throw 40 career touchdown passes (42). He was also the first to record over 2,500 total yards in four seasons, and the first to both pass for over 6,000 and rush for over 3,000 career yards.

Dunbar was a first-team All-B1G pick and unanimous first-team All-American in 1991 when he led the nation in rushing (1,805) and finished sixth in Heisman voting.

The Fort Wayne, Indiana, native posted consecutive 1,000-yard seasons and finished his career No. 3 on the career rushing charts at IU with 3,029 yards, a total that currently sits No. 7 all-time in program history. He led IU to a pair of bowl appearances and a win in the 1991 Copper Bowl as the game's offensive MVP.

Six Indiana football student-athletes are already among the less than one percent enshrined in the CFB Hall of Fame: **Zora Clevenger** (HB; 190–3), **Alvin "Bo" McMillin** (Coach; 1934-47), **Pete Pihos** (End/FB' 1942-43, 45-47), **George Taliaferro** (HB; 1945, 47-48), **Anthony Thompson** (RB; 1986-89) and **John Tavener** (1941-44).

FISCHER AMONG ICONIC VOICES IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

In his 53rd season with the Indiana football program, the legendary voice of the Hoosiers, Don Fischer, is among the longest tenured play-by-play voices in the sport.

The 2022 recipient of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's Chris Schenkel Award and IU Hall of Fame Class of 2022, Fischer is the longest tenured radio play-by-play announcer in college football, tied with Tommy Suggs of South

- He appeared in 20 games with 19 starts for the Golden Bears. He amassed 4,924 career all-purpose yards and accounted for 34 touchdowns.
- In 2024, he completed 265-of-386 of his passes for 3,004 yards, 16 touchdowns with 87 rushes for 105 yards and two rushing scores over the course of his 11 starts before missing the last week due to illness.

- It was just the ninth 3,000-yard passing season in California history. He finished top-10 on Cal's single-season passing charts in total offense yards (No. 7; 3,109 yards), passing efficiency (No. 8; 144.59) and yards passing (No. 9; 3,004 yards).
- Mendoza finished his Cal career as the all-time leader in completion percentage (66.4%) and tied for No. 7 in 250-yard passing games (10), equaling the marks of Gale Gilbert (10; 1980-84) and Aaron Rodgers (10; 2003-04) in career 250-yard passing games at Cal.
- He was ranked as the No. 14 overall prospect in the Transfer Portal and No. 3 quarterback per 247Sports.
- The 2023 season featured Mendoza earning the starting gig in the final eight games of the season. He threw for 1,708 yards on 153-of-243 passing attempts with 14 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. Mendoza also charted 48 rushes for 92 yards and two touchdowns.
- Mendoza was named fourth-team All-Pac 12 per Phil Steele and was Cal's Jonathan and Judy Hoff Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year in 2023.
- In Mendoza's career, he has completed 454-of-685 passing attempts for 5,150 yards with 34 touchdowns. Additionally, he has run for 251 career yards and five rushing scores while also catching one pass for a 15-yard touchdown
- Alberto Mendoza threw his first career touchdown pass on a 6-yard connection to **Charlie Becker** in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He served as the No. 3 quarterback for Indiana in 2024 and made his collegiate debut against Western Illinois in Week 2 (9/6).
- Mendoza enjoyed a standout career at the prep level, going 26-2 and twice being named the Class 4 Metro Florida Player of the Year.
- He threw for 4,596 yards passing and 57 touchdowns in his career and was considered a consensus three-star prospect by ESPN, 247Sports, Rivals and 0n3
- Indiana also brought in transfer **Grant Wilson** in the offseason to provide depth in the room.
- Wilson has appeared in 22 career games with 14 starts over five collegiate seasons, most recently playing for Old Dominion (2023-24) and prior to that, at Fordham (2020-22).
- At Old Dominion, he appeared in 15 games with 14 starts including 11 starts in 2023 when he accounted for 21 total touchdowns (17 passing, 4 rushing).
- In 2024, Wilson started three games before suffering a season-ending injury. He had five scores on the year (4 passing, 1 rushing).

• Wilson made his collegiate debut against Wagner (10/9) in the 2021 season while at Fordham.

- John Miller is in his second season coaching the Indiana running backs in 2025. Prior to Indiana, he coached the same position at James Madison for three seasons (2021-23).
- Miller's work with the running backs last year made for an instant success in 2024. The Indiana running backs helped combine for 37 rushing scores which tied for the most in a season in program history.
- Miller retained four holdovers from 2024 and added three newcomers to the mix for this season.
- Indiana's 313 yards rushing in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6) marked back-to-back games of 300-plus yards rushing after going for 309 in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30). It was the first time reaching the mark in consecutive games since 2014 (363, North Texas; 316, at lowa).
- With two rushing scores against the Owls, Indiana has recorded multiple rushing scores in 13 of Cignetti's 15 games.
- The 309 yards rushing in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) was the team's first 300-yard effort against an FBS team since 2016 (411 yards vs. Maryland).
- **Kaelon Black** had a strong showing in Week 1 against Old Dominion as he had 92 yards rushing and a touchdown.
- Black joined IU in 2024 after four years at James Madison (2020-23). He has registered 42 appearances with 16 starts over the course of his career.
- In 2024, Black appeared in all 13 games and logged 251 yards rushing on 46 attempts with two touchdowns. He recorded his first touchdown as a Hoosier in Week 4 against Charlotte (9/21).

- In 2023, Black made 12 starts and appeared in all 13 games at James Madison, logging 637 yards rushing with one touchdown and 254 receiving yards and four touchdown receptions.
- He owns two career 100-yard rushing games and has produced 2,275 career all-purpose yards and 14 touchdowns (8 rushing, 6 receiving).
- Roman Hemby's 25-yard reception in Week 2 against Kennesaw State pushed his consecutive games with a catch streak to 28. His mark leads all FBS running backs.
- Hemby had his eighth career 100-yard rushing game when he totaled 111 yards on the ground in his Indiana debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Hemby is the first IU running back to top the 100-yard mark in their Hoosier debut since *Jordan Howard* ran for 145 yards against Southern Illinois to open the 2015 season.
- In 2024, he started in all 12 games and totaled 607 rushing yards on 134 attempts and six touchdowns. He also logged 273 receiving yards on 40 receptions with one touchdown.
- Notched his first career game with both a rushing and receiving touchdown in Week 5 at Indiana (9/28).
- Hemby owns 3,589 all-purpose yards (2,522 rushing, 955 receiving, 112 kickoff return), has scored 27 career touchdowns (22 rushing, 5 receiving) and owns eight career 100-yard rushing games (1, 2025; 1, 2024; 2, 2023; 4, 2022).
- Hemby is a two-time honorable mention All-Big Ten (2022 & 2023).
- UAB transfer **Lee Beebe Jr.** posted 90 yards rushing with a touchdown in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He made his Indiana debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) and had 73 yards rushing on 11 attempts.
- Beebe Jr. spent the first three years of his career at UAB (2022-24) with 24 games played and 10 starts.
- In 2024, Beebe Jr. appeared in all 12 games and made 10 starts en route to being named third-team All-American Athletic Conference.
- Beebe Jr. has accumulated 1,791 career all-purpose yards (1,439 rushing, 317 receiving, 34 kickoff return, 1 fumble return) and totaled 13 career touchdowns (12 rushing, 1 receiving).
- He also owns three career 100-yard rushing games (1, 2023; 2, 2024) and has three career multi-rushing touchdown games (1, 2023; 2, 2024).

- Solomon Vanhorse is in his eighth season of college football, beginning
 his career back in 2018. He is one of three eighth-year players in the FBS
 in 2025.
- Vanhorse has made 51 career appearances with nine starts.
- In his first year at Indiana in 2024, Vanhorse appeared in all 13 games, primarily on special teams where he served as a primary kick returner. He returned five kickoffs for a total of 102 yards.
- Prior to Indiana, he spent six seasons at James Madison (2018-23) and played in 37 games with nine starts. He redshirted his initial college season and missed much of 2022 and 2023 due to injuries.
- In 2021, he became the 39th player in FBS or FCS since 1996 to return a kickoff for a touchdown, score a rushing touchdown and have a receiving touchdown in the same game (Towson, 11/20).
- Redshirt freshman **Khobie Martin** has appeared in both games of 2025 with two carries and six yards rushing in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- Martin appeared in two games of the 2024 season and logged 14 carries for 73 yards on the ground.
- He made his Hoosier debut in Week 2 against Western Illinois (9/6) and had a 31-yard rush.

- In his second year as Indiana's offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach, **Mike Shanahan**, is building upon a productive 2024 season.
- The Indiana offense had a PFF grade of 93.2 in 2024, which was best in the Big Ten and second-best in the country.
- Elijah Sarratt has caught a pass in each game of his career to lead the nation with a streak of 40-straight games with a reception. His nine catches for 97 yards in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6) continued that streak.
- In the win over Kennesaw State, Sarratt went for a career-high three receiving touchdowns for the first time since 2023 (at Coastal Carolina).
- In 2024, Sarratt started all 13 games with 957 yards receiving on 53 receptions and eight touchdowns. His performance earned him third-team All-Big Ten from the conference coaches and media and second-team All-Big Ten by the Associated Press.
- Sarratt graded as the No. 4 receiver in the Big Ten and No. 13 in Power 4 (80.8) per Pro Football Focus (min. 500 snaps).

- Sarratt owns 11 career 100-yard receiving games (4 at Indiana; 6 at JMU; 1 at SFU) and has posted multiple receiving touchdowns in eight games (3 at Indiana: 5 at JMU).
- After starting his tenure at JMU on the third unit, Sarratt had a breakout sophomore season in 2023. He finished among the top-35 among FBS pass catchers in yards receiving (No. 11; 1,191), touchdowns (No. 32; 8) and receptions (No. 22; 82) to earn First Team All-Sun Belt.
- Prior to James Madison, Sarratt played at Saint Francis (Pa.) as a true freshman in 2022. He was tabbed as a FCS Freshman All-America and firstteam All-Northeast Conference.
- Omar Cooper Jr. had a 75-yard rush for a touchdown in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). It tied for the longest touchdown run by an IU wide receiver since at least 1996 (*Shane Wynn* Michigan State, 2014) and was the longest rushing touchdown by a non-running back since 2014 (*Zander Diamont* Ohio State).
- In 2024, he made 13 appearances with four starts, 24 of his 28 receptions went for either a first down or touchdown.
- In the opening round of the College Football Playoff against Notre Dame (12/20), Cooper Jr. caught a 23-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter.
- He also caught deep touchdown passes in Week 2 (69 yards) against Western Illinois (9/6) and in Week 9 (42 yards) against Washington (10/26).
- Senior **E.J. Williams Jr.** scored on an 8-yard touchdown reception in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). It was his first touchdown as a Hoosier and his first since 2020 (vs. Notre Dame).
- Williams Jr. returned to Indiana after entering the transfer portal with four appearances and a redshirt season in 2024.
- In 2023, Williams Jr. played in eight games with three starts and missed four games due to injury.
- This will be Williams Jr.'s third year in Bloomington (2023-25) after spending the first three at Clemson (2020-22).
- Charlie Becker hauled in a 6-yard touchdown reception from Alberto Mendoza for his first career receiving touchdown in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He caught his first career pass on a 4-yard connection with **Fernando Mendoza** in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Becker appeared in 12 games as a true freshman in 2024, seeing time mostly on special teams. He logged 123 special teams snaps (46 kickoff return, 21 kickoff coverage, 53 punt return).

- In his collegiate debut in Week 2 against Western Illinois (9/6), he scored his first career touchdown on a 3-yard rush in the fourth quarter.
- Shanahan added **Makai Jackson** and **Tyler Morris** via the transfer portal to add some more experience to the room.
- Jackson was an accomplished receiver at both Saint Francis (Pa.) (2022) and Appalachian State (2023-24) prior to joining the Hoosiers.
- In 2024, Jackson appeared in all 11 games with 10 starts and caught a pass in every game played. He finished the year with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games.
- In 2022, he was named Freshman All-America along with now reunited teammate Elijah Sarratt.
- Jackson has logged 39 career games with 21 starts and owns a reception in 36 of 39 career games played.
- He boasts seven career 100-yard receiving games (5, 2022; 2, 2024) and has two multi-receiving touchdown games (2, 2022).
- Morris appeared in 34 career games with 14 starts, including 10 in 2024, at Michigan over the course of his first three seasons (2022-24).
- He suffered a season-ending injury over the summer that will sideline him for the 2025 season.
- Indiana added another transfer receiever in senior Jonathan Brady in the spring window from California where he teamed with Fernando Mendoza.
- Brady scored IU's first touchdown of the season on a 91-yard punt return in the first quarter, which is tied for the fourth-longest punt return in program history and the longest since *Lance Bennett* broke the program record of 94 yards in 2004 against Michigan State.
- His punt return touchdown was the first for IU since *D.J. Matthews Jr.* returned one 81 yards against Idaho (9/11/21).
- With 108 total punt return yards, Brady moved into No. 6 on the single-game charts and the most since J-Shun Harris (100), in 2018.
- In 2024, Brady appeared in all 13 games for Cal with 24 starts and caught 36 passes for 386 yards and three touchdowns.
- Prior to Cal, Brady spent his first two years (2022-23) at New Mexico where he saw time in 28 games with 21 starts.
- He owns two career 100-yard receiving games (2; 2023).
- True freshman **Lebron Bond** had his first career reception on a 12-yard catch for a first down in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).

- In addition to serving his second season as Indiana's special teams coordinator, **Grant Cain** continues his role with Indiana's tight ends unit.
- This is Cain's seventh year coaching the position group as he has done so every year in his time under **Curt Cignetti** (2019-present).
- Sixth-year senior **Riley Nowakowski** scored his first touchdown as a Hoosier on a 1-yard rushing score in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). It was his first career rushing attempt.
- He caught two passes for 15 yards in his Hoosier debut in in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Including his time at IU and his five years at Wisconsin (2020-24), Nowakowski has appeared in 42 career games with 12 starts.
- He started in nine of 12 games at Wisconsin in 2024 and caught 11 passes for 73 yards.
- In 2023, he made his first collegiate start against Ohio State (10/28) and caught his first career touchdown pass at Minnesota (11/25).
- He joined Wisconsin as a linebacker and went on to play that position and fullback before moving to tight end in 2023.
- **Holden Staes** joined IU for his senior season after spending last year at Tennessee and the first two of his college career at Notre Dame (2022-23).
- Staes made one catch for 4 yards in his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30)
- Over the course of his career, States has appeared in 37 games with 13 starts.
- In his lone season at Tennessee, Staes appeared in all 13 games with three starts and caught 15 passes for 131 receiving yards.

- James Bomba is the lone returner from the tight end unit and is in his fifth and final season in Bloomington. He has appeared in 31 games with 10 starts
- He caught his first career touchdown pass in Week 12 of the 2023 season versus Michigan State. He hauled in a 3-yard pass in the third quarter.
- Bomba is an Indiana legacy, as his father, *Matt Bomba* (1990-92), and grandfathers, *Brad Bomba* (1954-56) and *Bob Van Pelt* (1964-66), all lettered in football at IU. His mother, Kelly, is an executive associate athletic director for the Hoosiers.
- Bomba was put on scholarship in 2022 after joining the team as a walk-on in 2021

- Back for year three to lead the offensive line in Bloomington, **Bob Bostad** is continuing his progress with the unit as the lone holdover from Indiana's coaching staff in 2023.
- Bostad tutored 11 All-Americans over two stints at Wisconsin. That included eight on the offensive line, one tight end and two linebackers to earn All-America honors.
- The offensive line protected for 593 yards of total offense in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), marking back-to-back games with 500-plus yards of total offense for the first time since three-straight games from Weeks 4-6 in 2024.
- Indiana's consistent presence at left tackle is **Carter Smith**, who has started 27-straight games since Week 1 of 2023.
- His 2024 season earned him honorable mention All-Big Ten from the conference media and was part of an offensive line that was named a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award.
- Drew Evans returns from Indiana's stellar 2024 offensive line for his redshirt junior season.
- Evans made his first start in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) since suffering a season-ending injury prior to Week 11 against Michigan (11/9) in 2024.
- Prior to his nine starts in 2024, Evans did not see any game action in 2022 or 2023. He began his career in 2022 at Wisconsin before transferring to Indiana before the 2023 season.
- **Bray Lynch** is the third returning starter from the 2024 Indiana offensive line that earned semifinalist honors for the Joe Moore Award.
- Since becoming the team's starter at right guard at the start of 2024, Lynch has started every game at the positon since then.
- Lynch made nine appearances across the 2022 and 2023 seasons, logging his first career appearance against Idaho (9/10) in Week 2 of 2022.

- Kahlil Benson returns to Indiana after one season at Colorado in 2024. Benson spent the previous four seasons at IU (2020-23) where he played in 25 games with 17 starts.
- In both games back in Bloomington, Benson has started at right tackle.
- During his lone season in Boulder, Benson made nine appearances with four starts while battling injury and missing three games.
- Pat Coogan quickly emerged as Indiana's starting center and made his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30). Dating back to his time at Notre Dame (2021-24), Coogan has appeared in 32 career games with 28 starts.
- He helped lead Notre Dame to a national championship game appearance in 2024 as the team's starting center in the final 13 games of the season after an injury to Ashton Craig versus Purdue (9/14) in Week 3.
- He started all 13 games at left guard in 2023 and made his first collegiate appearance against Boston College in 2022.
- Zen Michalski has spent time on special teams for Indiana. He made his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Michalski, an Indiana native, returned to his home state after spending the first four years of his career at Ohio State (2021-24). He appeared in 29 career games with one start during his time in Columbus.
- Michalski made his first collegiate start against Nebraska (10/26) in 2024 before getting injured in that game and missing the final nine games of the season
- He saw 160 snaps at left tackle and one at left guard in 2024, while also logging 101 snaps on special teams.
- Coogan (Notre Dame) and Michalski (Ohio State) faced off in the 2025 College Football Playoff National Championship.

- Defensive coordinator **Bryant Haines** is in his second season serving in the role and as linebackers coach after a fantastic first year with the Hoosiers
- A two-time finalist for the Broyles Award, Haines' defense ranked No. 2 in total defense in the FBS last season, only allowing opponents to 256.3 yards per game and was the No. 1 rushing defense.
- Senior **Aiden Fisher** notched seven stops with 2.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He led the Big Ten in tackles a year ago with 118 stops. His 118 tackles were the most by a Hoosier in a single season since *TeGray Scales* (126) in 2016.
- Fisher became Indiana's first-ever first-team All-America linebacker in 2024 (FWAA, Phil Steele).
- He also was an All-conference performer in back-to-back seasons (2023, third-team All-Sun Belt; 2024 first-team All-Big Ten).
- The senior owns nine career double-digit tackle games (5 at IU; 4 at JMU).
- In his Indiana debut, he posted 12 tackles in the Week 1 win over FIU (8/31) in 2024.

- He has played in 38 career games with 26 starts, including starting all 15 games of his time at Indiana.
- Rolijah Hardy has emerged as the Hoosiers' second starting linebacker in 2025 after a breakout 2024 season where he played in all 13 games with four starts as a true freshman.
- In Week 2 of 2024 against Western Illinois (9/7), Hardy etched his name into the record book. He returned his first career interception for a touchdown and was the first true freshman with an interception return for the touchdown since *Jameel Cook Jr.* versus FIU in 2015.
- Hardy also forced a fumble in that game to become the first IU defender to have two forced turnovers in a game since 2022.
- He made his first collegiate start in Week 8 against Nebraska (10/19) when he grabbed his second interception of the season.
- Hardy attended Lakeland (Fla.) High School before spending one year at the Naval Academy Preparatory School in 2023.
- Isaiah Jones logged his first career solo sack in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Jones has made 19 appearances with two starts at Indiana (2022-25) and registered snaps in every game 2024-25 (15 games).
- He tied for the Big Ten lead with teammate **Bryson Bonds** and tied for No. 2 in Power 4 in special teams tackles (9) in 2024.
- In Week 4 of 2024 against Charlotte (9/21), he had six tackles and his first career tackle for loss on a solo stop in the second quarter.
- He made his first collegiate start in Week 6 at Northwestern (10/5).
- His father, D.J., lettered in football at Ohio State (1992-94, 96). D.J. was part of the 1992 Big Ten co-championship team and the 1996 Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship team.
- After not playing at all his first two seasons at Indiana (2022-23), **Jeff Utzinger** has registered snaps in every game of 2024 and 2025.
- In his appearances, he mostly has seen time on special teams and racked up five tackles in the 2024 season.
- Utzinger collected his first career tackle on the final play of the game in Week 1 against FIU (8/31).

- **Kaiden Turner** has made 14 career appearances with one start across his four years on campus.

- Amari Kamara is a true freshman and younger brother of Hoosier defensive end and All-American Mikail Kamara.
- The younger Kamara compiled 104 stops and 2.0 sacks in his senior season at Stone Bridge High School in Ashburn, Virginia.
- PJ Nelson is another true freshman in the Indiana linebacker core.
- As a standout at Princeton High School in Cincinnati, Nelson was selected as the Ohio Prep Sports Writers Association Defensive Player of the Year as a junior as well as the Greater Miami Conference Player of the Year and Cincinnati Enquirer Defensive Player of the Year.
- In his senior year, he totaled 137 tackles (85 solo) with 24.0 tackles for loss and 8.0 sacks as a senior, added one interception and scored two defensive tauchdowns.
- Nelson was ranked as a consensus three-star prospect by ESPN, 247Sports, Rivals and On3.

- Defensive tackles coach **Pat Kuntz** and defensive ends coach **Buddha** Williams are each in their second seasons leading the defensive line for the
 Hoosiers
- They retained a star in redshirt senior **Mikail Kamara** when he elected to come back to Bloomington after leading all of FBS in total pressures (73) in 2024.
- In his first season as a Hoosier in 2024, Kamara had 15.0 tackles for loss and 10.0 sacks
- Kamara owns at least one tackle in every game played, with at least 0.5 tackle for loss in 31 of his 38 career games.
- He notched five total tackles with 2.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He garnered second-team All-America from The Athletic and third-team All-America per the Association Press and was named a finalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy, tabbed a semifinalist Bednarik Award.

- Kamara was also a consensus first-team All-Big Ten pick by the conference's coaches, media and Associated Press.
- He was named the Bednarik National Defensive Player of the Week and Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week after 4.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks at Michigan State (11/2) in Week 10.
- **Tyrique Tucker** was a key rotational piece to the defensive line in 2024 and has started through Weeks 1-2.
- He appeared in all 13 games in 2024 and was graded as the No. 9 defensive interior in the Big Ten and No. 25 nationally (78.2) per Pro Football Focus (min. 300 snaps).

- Ndukwe appeared in all 13 games in 2024 and logged 17 snaps on defense and 117 on special teams where he made a major impact.
- In Week 5 against Maryland (9/28), he blocked his first career kick on a Terrapin punt. He blocked a second punt in Week 10 at Michigan State (11/2) in the fourth quarter.

- Stephen Daley had three tackles and 1.0 tackles for loss in his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30). He has appeared in 36 career games including 24 starts at Kent State (2022-24).
- In 2024, Daley logged 9.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery.
- **Dominique Ratcliff** has appeared in 40 career games, including 38 appearances with four starts over five collegiate seasons at Texas State (2022-24) and Louisiana (2020-21).

- In Week 9 of 2024 against Washington (10/26), Ponds logged his first career multi-interception game when he caught two picks.
- Ponds has started 24 games of his 27 career appearances spanning across his time at James Madison (2023) and Indiana (2024-present).

- **Ola Adams** is back for his second year coaching Indiana's safeties and defensive backs in 2024.
- In 2023, Adams was a defensive analyst and analytics coordinator at Penn State. Prior to 2023, Adams coached defensive backs across the collegiate and professional ranks.
- Adams coached at Villanova from 2015-21, tutoring the defensive backs and serving as the team's defensive coordinator from 2019-21. He also was defensive backs assistant for the Denver Broncos in 2022.
- Amare Ferrell made the first of three IU interceptions in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Ferrell has started every game since 2024 (15 games) and has made 27 career appearances.
- \bullet He rated as the No. 8 safety (78.2) in the Big Ten for the 2024 season per Pro Football Focus.
- He posted his first career multi-interception games at Michigan State (11/2) in 2024 with a pair of second-quarter picks.

- In his first career start in Week 1 against FIU (8/31), Ferrell grabbed his first career interception and posted two tackles.
- He was one of seven true freshmen in the program to debut in 2023 and the only not to redshirt (played in all 12 games).

- Bonds made his first career takeaway when he recovered a fumble at Ohio State (11/12) in 2022.
- Louis Moore made it back-to-back weeks with seven tackles and an interception in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). He also notched 1.5 tackles for loss in the win.

- Cain's unit earned an 88.7 grade by PFF in the 2024 season which graded out at No. 4 nationally and No. 2 in the Big Ten.
- In his time leading special teams units, he has notched three All-America honors and 13 All-Conference selections.
- Nicolas Radicic has 16 career appearances at IU and has started as the team's field goal specialist in every game since the start of the 2024 season (15 games).
- Radicic made one appearance in his redshirt season in 2023.
- In Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), Radicic's 8-for-8 effort on extra points pushed him to No. 8 on the career extra points made charts with 82. He passed *Logan Justus* (77; 2018-2019).
- He finished No. 2 in FBS in extra points made (69) and posted an FBS-best 5.3 extra points made per game in 2024.
- $\bullet \mbox{ Radicic also broke Indiana's single-season record for extra points made last year and it only took him nine games to claim the record.$

- He is 13-of-14 (.929) on field goal attempts and 82-of-82 (1.000) on extra point attempts in his collegiate career.
- Radicic holds five of the top-10-single-game extra points made marks with No. 1 (11; Western Illinois, 2024), No. 3 (9; Purdue, 2024), T-No. 4 (8; Kennesaw State, 2025), (8; Nebraska, 2024) and T-No. 8 (7; Charlotte, 2024).
- A five-star prospect per Kohl's Kicking, Nico Radicic was rated the No. 3 kicker nationally by 247Sports and the No. 4 kicking prospect by ESPN in the class of 2023. He was selected to participate in the 2023 Army All-American Rowl, as well
- Radicic was an all-district performer for Coppell (Texas) High School, after moving to America from Croatia in 2016.
- **Brendan Franke** arrived to Bloomington in 2025 and assumed the kickoff specialist duties for the Hoosiers.
- Franke has logged a touchback on all 14 kickoffs in his time as a Hoosier, and has a career touchback rate of .719 (161-of-224) over the course of his college career.
- He has appeared in 51 career games. He played in 12 games at Texas State (2024), four appearances at Georgia Southern (2023) and redshirted after playing 24 games over two seasons at Nebraska (2021–22). He saw time in nine games in one season at Morningside (Iowa) College (2020).
- Mitch McCarthy is the only punter on the roster and is in his first season as a Hoosier.
- McCarthy had one punt for 47 yards in his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) before exiting the game with injury which caused him to miss Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- McCarthy spent three seasons at UCF (2022-24) prior to IU and before then he had never played a snap of American football.
- The Australia native spent one year at Village Christian High School in California and participated in basketball before he was selected as the No. 7 overall pick in the 2016 Australian Rules Football Rookie Draft by Collingwood and then trained with ProKick Australia in the fall of 2021.
- After not playing in the first two games of UCF's 2022 season, McCarthy made 37-straight appearances through Week 1 of 2025, including every game of the Golden Knights' 2023 and 2024 campaigns.
- He has notched 40 punts inside the 20-yard line and and has averaged 43.0 yards per punt on 116 career punts.
- McCarthy, 27, is the fourth oldest player in FBS Football with the only players older being 29 or 30 years-old.

- In Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), sophomore **Quinn Warren** had a 49-yard punt to the Kennesaw State 5-yard line in the second quarter to mark the second time out of three career punts that he has pinned it inside the opponent's 10-yard line.
- Warren punted in the second half in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) to relieve McCarthy. Warren had one punt travel 38 yards and land inside the 5.
- Warren appeared in seven games in 2024 as a kickoff specialist due to injuries in the special teams unit.
- Long snapper **Mark Langston** is in second season with the IU program and has started every game at long snapper since coming to Bloomington.
- His strong performance in the 2024 season earned him preseason recognition, being named to the Mannelly Award watch list which honors the best long snapper in the FBS.
- He is in his seventh and final collegiate season after spending two years at Kennesaw State (2019-20) and three years at Georgia Southern (2021-23) before coming to Bloomington in 2024.
- Langston started in all 13 games for the Hoosiers in 2024 and has appeared in 37 collegiate games. The first 22 of those came at Georgia Southern. He did not see any game action at Kennesaw State.
- \bullet He missed the entire 2023 season due to an ACL injury sustained at the end of his 2022 campaign.

INDIANA RESURGENCE

- Cignetti has immediately elevated the Indiana program with a programrecord 11 victories in his first season at the helm and a College Football Playoff appearance.
- After helping the Hoosiers to an 11-2 record and an 8-1 mark in the Big Ten –
 both win totals are program-bests he was named the Hayes-Schembechler
 Big Ten Coach of the Year (coaches) and Dave McClain Coach of the Year
 (media) from the conference office.
- The accolades didn't stop there, as he was named the Home Depot National Coach of the Year at the annual ESPN Home Depot Awards and added national coaching honors from The Sporting News, FWAA, Associate Press, Walter Camp Football Foundation and AFCA.
- Cignetti is the first-ever Division I head coach to start 10-0 in consecutive seasons at different schools. (James Madison, 2023; Indiana, 2024).
- One of six Big Ten coaches that started their Big Ten tenures with 10-0 overall records in the AP Poll Era (since 1936): Cignetti (2024), Ryan Day (Ohio State, 2018-19), Urban Meyer (Ohio State, 2012), Earle Bruce (Ohio State, 1979), Bennie Oosterbaan (Michigan, 1948-49) and Carroll Widdoes (Ohio State, 1944-45).
- Cignetti engineered a 7.5-game improvement from Indiana's 2023 to 2024 season, a number that sits as the fourth-best improvement by a first-year head coach since at least 1996 and is the best by a Power 4 head coach since 2012 (Gus Malzahn, Auburn: 8 games).
- He is the only Indiana head coach to begin his head coaching tenure 4-0 or better and his 11 wins set the mark for wins by a first-year IU head coach, previously held by James M. Sheldon (8; 1905).
- A win over FIU in Week 1, Cignetti became the 15th coach in program history to win the first game of his Indiana tenure and the first to do since Bill Lynch in 2007. He was the eighth IU frontman to start 2-0 and fourth to begin 3-0.
- Joins Clyde B. Smith (1948) as the only first-year Indiana head coaches to win their first game at IU and their initial Big Ten game.
- The 77 points in the Western Illinois set the single-game program record for points in a game and the 66 points against Purdue in a 66-0 shutout are the most by an IU team in a Big Ten game. The previous marks were 76 (Franklin College, 1901) and 63 (at Wisconsin, 2001).
- The 29-point margin of victory at UCLA was Indiana's largest in a Big Ten road game since defeating Wisconsin (Oct. 6), 63-32, in 2001.
- Indiana's offense has set program records for total touchdowns (70), offensive touchdowns scored (68), and rushing touchdowns (tied; 37).
- Bryant Haines and Mike Shanahan have been with Cignetti for the long haul. Both took jobs at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and were elevated to coordinator for the first time at James Madison under Cignetti.
- Along with the six assistant coaches, Cignetti saw 13 key contributors from his previous stop join the IU program via the transfer portal in 2024.

SUCCESS AT JAMES MADISON

- Prior to becoming Indiana's head coach in December 2023, Cignetti amassed massive success at James Madison in his five-year tenure in Harrisonburg.
- Cignetti's Dukes teams went 52-9 from 2019-23, including a 19-4 mark in 2022 and 2023, JMU's first two years as an FBS program.
- 2023 was nothing short of magical for James Madison as the team went 11-1, had a 7-1 mark in the Sun Belt while winning the eastern division and spent time in the national rankings.
- Cignetti became the first coach to lead his team into the Top 25 during a program's first year of transition from FCS to FBS.
- In 2023, JMU clinched the school's first bowl bid, back-to-back Sun Belt East titles, and a Top-25 ranking for six-straight weeks.
- In Week Two (9/9), James Madison went on the road and defeated the flagship school of the state, the University of Virginia, in dramatic fashion, 36-35.
- The outstanding season earned Cignetti 2023 Sun Belt Coach of the Year.
- In 2022, JMU went 8-3 overall with a 6-2 mark in conference play to finish tied for first in the Sun Belt East Division. The Dukes opened with a 5-0 record, earning its Top-25 nod for the first time.
- Prior to FBS football, Cignetti led his JMU teams to equal levels of success in the Colonial Athletic Association and the FCS from 2019-21.
- The Dukes clinched three-consecutive CAA championships and playoff appearances, a berth in the 2019 FCS national championship game, and FCS semifinal appearances in 2020 and 2021.
- In his five years at James Madison, Cignetti's teams went 31-4 in conference play.
- Cignetti led James Madison to a 14-2 record and the national title appearance in his first campaign in Harrisonburg in 2019. JMU reeled off 14 consecutive wins, went 8-0 in league play, and notched eight nationally-ranked wins, with three inside the Top 10.
- The Dukes went 7-1 and reached the FCS semifinals in 2020, and finished 12-2 with a conference championship and semifinal appearance in their final FCS season in 2021.

- A 2019 Eddie Robinson Award finalist, Cignetti mentored 27 Dukes to All-America status. At the conference level, he tutored one Player of the Year, three Offensive Players of the Year, two Defensive Players of the Year, and one Special Teams Player of the Year.
- James Madison totaled 72 all-conference honorees, including 2023 Sun Belt Player of the Year quarterback Jordan McCloud and 2023 Defensive Player of the Year defensive lineman Jalen Green. Additionally, 17 Dukes carded spots on the All-Sun Belt team.

RAPID TURNAROUND AT ELON

- Prior to his stint at James Madison, Cignetti amassed a 14-9 record in two years at Elon (2017-18), a program that went 12-45 in the previous five campaigns.
- The Phoenix qualified for the FCS Playoffs in both seasons, just the second and third playoff berths in program history (2009).
- Cignetti led Elon to a six-win improvement in 2017, going 8-4 and finishing second in the CAA at 6-2. The Phoenix defeated four ranked opponents and returned to the national rankings for the first time since 2010.
- His squad also went on an eight-game winning streak, the first from an Elon football team since 2009.
- He was named Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year as the Phoenix reached the postseason and finished 20th in the national rankings.
- The great success also put him in line for a fourth-place finish in the voting for the Eddie Robinson Award.
- Elon secured a second-straight playoff appearance in 2018, with the ninthranked Phoenix knocking off No. 2 James Madison for the program's first-ever win over an FCS Top-5 opponent. The victory also snapped the Dukes' 22-game conference winning streak.

THE JUP DAYS

- $\hbox{\bf Cignetti's in augural head-coaching opportunity came at Indiana University of Pennsylvania from 2011-16. } \\$
- The IUP job was personally special for Cignetti as that is where his father, Frank Cignetti Sr., patrolled the sidelines for 20 years as head coach and played his college football.
- His father, Frank, is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame after playing at IUP and compiling a coaching record of 199-77-1 at West Virginia (1976-79) and IUP (1986-2005).
- The field at IUP is named in his honor (Frank Cignetti Field @ George P. Miller Stadium).
- Curt Cignetti went 53-17 with three playoff appearances and four Top 25s in six campaigns as the IUP head coach.
- The Crimson Hawks touted a 33-11 ledger in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference after a 4-10 two-year stretch prior to his arrival. Cignetti was 4-3 in the playoffs and had a final ranking as high as 12th (2016).

BEFORE HE WAS A HEAD COACH

- Cignetti's 27-year tenure as an FBS assistant coach featured a spot on Nick Saban's first coaching staff at Alabama. He served as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator (2007-10).

- The Crimson Tide went 12-2 in 2008, the same year Cignetti helped corral the nation's No. 1 recruiting class. Alabama followed with an undefeated national championship season in 2009, and a 10-win campaign in 2010.
- He joined the Crimson Tide after a seven-year stint as recruiting coordinator (2000-06), tight ends coach (2000-02), and quarterbacks coach (2003-04) at North Carolina State.
- The Wolfpack reached five bowl games, including the 2002 Gator Bowl squad that set a program record with 11 victories.
- His first run as a recruiting coordinator came at Pitt from (1993-99), where he also coached tight ends and quarterbacks at various times under College Football Hall of Fame head coach Johnny Majors.
- Cignetti started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pitt (1983-84) and was part of its Fiesta Bowl team his first year. He mentored quarterbacks and receivers at Davidson in 1985, and he oversaw the quarterbacks at Rice (1986-88) and Temple (1989-92).
- Cignetti graduated from West Virginia in 1982, where he lettered as a quarterback and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration.

- Curt and his wife, Manette, have three children, Natalie, Carly and Curtis. Natalie was an honorable mention All-American in volleyball at IUP.
- Cignetti earned his bachelor's degree from West Virginia University in 1982.


