SETTING THE SCENE

- No. 2/2/2 Indiana will head to the state capital to face No. 1/1/1 Ohio State in the Discover Big Ten Championship Game on Saturday (Dec. 6) at 8 p.m. inside Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis on FOX.
- The game marks Indiana's first appearance in the Big Ten Championship Game and the first time Indiana has won a share of the Big Ten regular season championship since 1967.
- Ohio State won last year's game in Columbus, 38-15, and leads the series, 81-12-5. Indiana is seeking its first win over Ohio State since 1988.
- Saturday's contest will be the 52nd time ever that the No. 1 and No. 2 team in the AP poll (since 1936) face off. It is the third time in a conference championship game and 10th time that two teams from the same conference will meet. The last No. 1 versus No. 2 game was in 2022 between Georgia and Tennessee. There have been two previous iterations amongst Big Ten teams (Iowa-Michigan, 1985; Ohio State-Michigan, 2006).

- Indiana's ranking in the AP and USA Today/US LBM Coaches Poll is No. 2 for the seventh-straight week. The Hoosiers also have been ranked at No. 2 in each of the four editions of the College Football Playoff rankings this season.
- The 23 victories since the beginning of the 2024 season are the most in any two-year span in program history and rank tied for No. 4 nationally in that time. The 17 Big Ten wins during that span are also the most in a two-year stretch in IU history. **MORE ON PAGE 4**
- **Curt Cignetti's** 23 victories in his first two seasons at Indiana are the second most in Big Ten history by a coach in his first two seasons at a school. The victory over Purdue broke a tie with Fielding Yost (22, 1901-02; Michigan) and he trails only Urban Meyer (24, 2012-13; Ohio State).
- Cignetti's 23 wins are tied for No. 6 in FBS history by a coach in his first two seasons at a school.
- Indiana capped the first perfect regular season in program history with a 12-0 record. The only other IU team to finish without a loss is the 1945 team at 9-0-1. The 12 victories are the most in a single season.
- The nine Big Ten wins are the most in program history and the 9-0 mark is the first time IU has won each of its conference games in a single season.
- Since 1980, there have only been 12 perfect regular seasons in the Big Ten (6, Ohio State; 3, Michigan; 1, Penn State; 1, Oregon; 1 Indiana).
- The Hoosiers are 43-27-1 all-time as a ranked team, which includes a 36-20-1 mark in Big Ten play.
- Indiana finished the regular season with an unblemished record on the road for just the third time in program history: 2025 (5-0), 1920 (3-0) and 1910 (2-0). The 1945 team went 5-0-1.
- The Hoosiers finished the regular season with an unblemished record at Memorial Stadium, its sixth such season since the venue opened in 1960. The other seasons include 1967 (5-0), 1987 (6-0), 1991 (5-0), 2020 (3-0), and 2024 (8-0).
- Head coach **Curt Cignetti** started a season with a 12-0 mark for the first time in his head coaching tenure, after he started back-to-back seasons at 10-0 (Indiana, 2024; James Madison, 2023).
- The 56-3 win over Purdue marked the sixth time in program history that Indiana has won by 50-or-more points with three of those coming in Big Ten play. The three 50-plus point wins in conference play are the only such wins in program history.
- **Fernando Mendoza** threw two touchdown passes in the win over the Boilermakers to move him to 32 on the year, the most of any Hoosier in a single season and is No. 1 in the FBS and Big Ten. **MORE ON PAGE 7**
- **Elijah Sarratt** and **Omar Cooper Jr.** are tied for the Big Ten lead with 11 touchdown receptions with Jeremiah Smith (Ohio State) and Makai Lemon (USC). The Hoosier duo is also among the top-10 of the program's career receiving touchdowns charts. **MORE ON PAGE 9**
- **Stephen Daley** had 4.5 tackles for loss versus the Boilermakers to put him at No. 1 in the Big Ten with 18.0. **MORE ON PAGE 13**

PACKING & DEFENDING THE ROCK

In just his second year at the helm of the Indiana program, head coach **Curt Cignetti** has made Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium a daunting place for opposing teams to play.

The Hoosiers are 15-0 in home games on Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium under Cignetti. The 15-straight home wins is also a program record and leads the nation in active home-winning streak.

Starting with the Nebraska game on Oct. 19, 2024, Indiana sold out its final four home contests of the 2024 season. The Nebraska sellout was the program's first since 2021. Indiana did the same thing in 2025, selling out its last four home games in 2025 (Illinois, Michigan State, UCLA, Wisconsin).

In 2024, Indiana defeated seven of their eight home opponents by double digits and won on average by 35.5 points at home.

In 2025, Indiana improved upon that, winning all seven of its home games by double digits, with an average margin of victory of 40.7 points. Six of those wins came by at least 24 points and three were by 50-plus.

Across both seasons, Indiana has defeated its home opponents by an average of 37.9 points.

#PROIU

Indiana is represented by 13 alums in the National Football League to start the 2025 season, which includes eight offensive players and five defensive players.

The longest tenured Hoosiers in the NFL are **Dan Feeney** (9th), **Nate Sudfeld** (9th), **Ian Thomas** (8th) and **Nick Westbrook-Ikhine** (7th), who have all spent at least five seasons in the league.

Of the 13, five of the Hoosiers in the league are rookies who played for **Curt Cignetti** in 2024.

CHANGING THE CULTURE

When he arrived in Bloomington, head coach Curt Cignetti talked about injecting life into the fan base, and with a 15-0 record on Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium, he has done just that.

Since the stadium capacity expanded to 50,000-plus in 1970, Indiana has sold out 18 home games. Of those 18, eight have come under Cignetti's watch. Since 1970, only six seasons have featured multiple sellouts, with 2024 and 2025 among those.

The four sellouts in both 2024 and 2025 mark the second-most in a single season in program history, with the 1969 team selling out all five homes games.

FAMILY REUNION

When redshirt junior quarterback **Fernando Mendoza** elected to transfer to Indiana after spending three years at California, he reunited with his brother and fellow quarterback, **Alberto Mendoza**, to become teammates for the first time since 2022 when they attended Christopher Columbus High School in Miami together. They are the only active set of brothers to share the same quarterback room in FBS Football.

In the Week 2 win over Kennesaw State, they become the first set of brothers to throw a touchdown pass in the same game of the same team since 2015 when Arkansas' Brandon Allen and Austin Allen did so against UT Martin (10/31/2015).

The brothers followed up with more touchdowns in Week 3 against Indiana State. Fernando accounted for six total scores, including five passing touchdowns, while Alberto threw two touchdowns.

In Week 9 against UCLA, Fernando totaled four touchdowns (3 passing; 1 rushing) and Alberto had one rushing score.

The Mendozas continued their scoring attack in Week 10 at Maryland when Fernando and Alberto each threw for a touchdown.

To cap the regular season, Fernando had two passing touchdowns and one rushing while Alberto threw for one in Week 14 at Purdue.

FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

The 2025 season marks the fourth consecutive year that Indiana plays in a Friday night game.

It is also the first time that the Hoosiers play in two regular season Friday night contests in one season. Indiana defeated Indiana State, 73-0, in Week 3, and won at Purdue, 56-3, in Week 14.

The first Friday game at Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium came at noon in 1995 in a battle for the Old Oaken Bucket and was the only Friday game on IU's campus until 2022 versus Illinois.

WISE BEYOND HIS YEARS

Indiana punter and newcomer **Mitch McCarthy** ranks as the fourth oldest player in FBS football this season. McCarthy is one of seven 27-year-olds in college football, the oldest Big Ten player and the second oldest player in the Power 4. *Research by University of Hawaii Athletics Communications.*

McCarthy, 27, spent three seasons at UCF (2022-24) before coming to IU. He did not begin playing American football until 2022. He spent one year at Village Christian High School in California and participated in basketball before he was selected as the No. 7 overall pick in the 2016 Australian Rules Football Rookie Draft by Collingwood and then trained with ProKick Australia in the fall of 2021.

Indiana head coach **Curt Cignetti** has compiled an impressive 140-37 record across his 15 years as a head coach, including stops at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (2011-16), Elon (2017-18) or James Madison (2019-23).

No matter if he was coaching in the Division II ranks, the FCS level or in the FBS, winning close games is a difference-making part of Cignetti's success with a 29-18 record in games decided by one score.

After going 6-9 in one-score games at IUP, Cignetti has a combined 22-9 record in one-score contests from 2017-25. He went 10-2 in such games at Elon and 10-7 while at James Madison. At Indiana, he's only coached in three games that came down to one score. In 2025, Indiana won in Week 5 at Iowa, 20-15, and in Week 11 at Penn State, 27-24. Last season, Indiana defeated Michigan, 20-15, on Nov. 9 on Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium.

Cignetti has never had a losing season as a head coach.

Hoosier The Bison made its first public debut at the season opener against Old Dominion on Aug. 30 at Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium.

The state of Indiana and the bison have been linked for more than two centuries. The bison has been used as an Indiana symbol longer than Indiana has been a U.S. state. The bison first appeared on official court documents signed by then Indiana Territory Governor and future U.S. President William Henry Harrison in 1801, a full 15 years before Indiana became the country's 19th state in 1816. The Indiana Territory seal depicted a woodsman chopping trees while a bison runs in the foreground, symbolizing the country's expansion on the Indiana frontier (at the time, the western boundary of the United States). The bison has been a part of the Indiana state seal ever since.

At the recommendation of the IU Student Athletic Board and confirmed by the Indiana University Student Senate, the bison mascot was officially adopted and brought to life on October 14, 1965. While the original intent was to have a live bison, that never came to fruition, so the first bison mascot debuted just in time for the final home football game that year – the Old Oaken Bucket game on November 20, 1965.

The 1966 Indiana Football season featured a new costume that was focused on a more realistic look with a very large, authentic-looking bison head. This look lasted through the 1967 season before moving on to a costume more catered to the performer inside with an emphasis on an ease of mobility.

The new bison mascot costume debuted just in time for the January 1, 1968, Rose Bowl matchup with USC. The updated bison costume returned for the 1968 and 1969 seasons but student and fan support for the bison mascot began to wane and ultimately led to a long hiatus from the campus.

STAFF UPDATE

After an outstanding 2024 season, Indiana head coach **Curt Cignetti** retained nearly the entire coaching staff from the previous campaign.

The only countable on-field assistant to leave was quarterbacks/co-offensive coordinator Tino Sunseri, who took the same position at UCLA.

Chandler Whitmer replaced Sunseri as the new head of the quarterbacks for Indiana in December 2024. Whitmer came to Bloomington after serving as a pass game specialist for the Atlanta Falcons in 2024.

Five of Cignetti's staff members were with him at James Madison, including: defensive coordinator/linebackers **Bryant Haines**, offensive coordinator/wide receivers **Mike Shanahan**, special teams coordinator/tight ends **Grant Cain**, defensive tackles **Pat Kuntz** and running backs **John Miller**.

A NEW & HISTORIC PARTNERSHIP

Just over a week before the start of the 2025 season, Indiana announced that IU Athletics and Merchants Bank formed a new partnership in support of the University's Department of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The agreement includes a \$50 million commitment over 20 years. As part of the agreement with Indiana Athletics and Learfield's IU Sports Properties, Memorial Stadium's playing surface has been named renamed Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium, effectively immediately.

While the new branding is the biggest change that IU fans will see, what separates this agreement from many others is that it extends well beyond naming rights. An exciting part of the partnership for IU student-athletes – both present and future – is that Merchants Bank will provide them with comprehensive financial literacy training. This training will be at no cost to the student-athletes and will help ensure that they have the tools to maximize their opportunities in a new intercollegiate athletics landscape that includes, among other things, revenue sharing and NIL.

"Merchants Bank Field at Memorial Stadium" is prominently displayed in multiple locations on the stadium's playing surface. New interior, exterior and directional signage debuted during the team's Week 1 opener against Old Dominion (Aug. 30).

This is the first time in program history that Memorial Stadium's field will have its own distinct name.

TWO HOOSIERS ON COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME BALLOT

A pair of Indiana All-Americans in running back **Vaughn Dunbar** (1990-91) and quarterback **Antwaan Randle El** (1998-2001) are on the ballot for the College Football Hall of Fame in 2025.

Randle El earned All-Big Ten distinction in 1999, 2000 and 2001, and was named Big Ten Freshman of the Year in 1998. The Big Ten MVP, and first-team All-American in 2001, Randle El finished sixth in the Heisman Trophy balloting that season.

The Riverdale, Illinois, native was the first in NCAA history to score 40 career touchdowns (45) and throw 40 career touchdown passes (42). He was also the first to record over 2,500 total yards in four seasons, and the first to both pass for over 6,000 and rush for over 3,000 career yards.

Dunbar was a first-team All-B1G pick and unanimous first-team All-American in 1991 when he led the nation in rushing (1,805) and finished sixth in Heisman voting.

The Fort Wayne, Indiana, native posted consecutive 1,000-yard seasons and finished his career No. 3 on the career rushing charts at IU with 3,029 yards, a total that currently sits No. 7 all-time in program history. He led IU to a pair of bowl appearances and a win in the 1991 Copper Bowl as the game's offensive MVP.

Six Indiana football student-athletes are already among the less than one percent enshrined in the CFB Hall of Fame: **Zora Clevenger** (HB; 190–3), **Alvin "Bo" McMillin** (Coach; 1934-47), **Pete Pihos** (End/FB' 1942-43, 45-47), **George Taliaferro** (HB; 1945, 47-48), **Anthony Thompson** (RB; 1986-89) and **John Tavener** (1941-44).

FISCHER AMONG ICONIC VOICES IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL

In his 53rd season with the Indiana football program, the legendary voice of the Hoosiers, Don Fischer, is among the longest tenured play-by-play voices in the sport.

The 2022 recipient of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's Chris Schenkel Award and IU Hall of Fame Class of 2022, Fischer is the longest tenured radio play-by-play announcer in college football, tied with Tommy Suggs of South Carolina.

- **Chandler Whitmer** leads the revamped quarterback room and serves as co-offensive coordinator. The only new on-field coaching staff member comes to Bloomington by way of the Atlanta Falcons where he was a pass game specialist for the team in 2024.
- Redshirt junior **Fernando Mendoza** transferred to IU this winter after three seasons at California (2022-24) and is the older brother of fellow Indiana quarterback **Alberto Mendoza**.
- They are reunited for the first time since being teammates in 2022 at Christopher Columbus High School in Miami, Florida.
- The brothers each tossed a touchdown pass in Week 2, to become the first set of brothers to throw a touchdown pass in the same FBS game for the same team since 2015 when Arkansas' Brandon Allen and Austin Allen did so against UT Martin (10/31/2015).
- Since Week 2, the brothers have each accounted for a touchdown in the same game five other times.

- Mendoza has more touchdowns passes in a single season than any Hoosier (32). His two touchdown passes in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28), and moved into a tie with **Harry Gonso** (32; 1967-69) for No. 8 on the program's career charts. He trails **Richard Lagow** (34, 2016-17) for No. 7.
- His 32 touchdown passes rank No. 1 in the FBS and the Big Ten. Including his six rushing scores and his 38 touchdowns accounted for are No. 2 in the FBS and lead the Big Ten.
- His four touchdowns in Week 12 against Wisconsin (11/15) marked his fifth in 2025 with at least four touchdown passes, the most by a Hoosier quarterback in a single season in program history.
- Mendoza's 117 yards passing pushed his season total to 2,758 and at No. 8 on the single-season charts, passing **Cameron Coffman** (2,734; 2012). He trails **Peyton Ramsey** (2,875, 2018) for No. 7.
- Mendoza has passed for over 200 yards in nine games as a Hoosier, which is tied for No. 3 in single-season history. His total only trails Nate Sudfeld (2015) and Kellen Lewis (2007) for the top spot at 10.

- Mendoza is the third Big Ten quarterback since 2000 with three-straight games of at least four passing touchdowns and zero interceptions - *C.J. Stroud* (Ohio State; 2021) and *Kyle Orton* (Purdue; 2004, four straight since he did so in Weeks 2-4 against Kennesaw State, Indiana State and Illinois.
- His 91.7% completion percentage against the Badgers is good for No. 3 on the game completion percentage charts, giving him the top three games in program history (min. 20 attempts).

- Mendoza is the only FBS quarterback since at least 1996 with three-or-more games of four touchdowns and a completion percentage better than .900 in a single season or career. Bryce Young of Alabama is the only other FBS quarterback with multiple occurrences in the same season (2021; vs. New Mexico State & Southern Miss), while Cade Klubnik of Clemson is the only other with multiple games in a career (2; 2024 & 2025).
- In Week 11 at Penn State (11/8), Mendoza scored a rushing touchdown for the third consecutive week and threw the go-ahead touchdown pass to **Omar Cooper Jr.** with 36 seconds remaining.
- His first 300-yard passing day at Indiana and fourth of his career came in Week 8 versus Michigan State (10/18) when he went for 332 yards and four touchdowns on 24-of-28 passing.
- Mendoza connected with **Elijah Sarratt** for an 8-yard touchdown and a 27-20 Indiana lead with 6:23 remaining in Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11).
- He had 233 yards passing on 13-of-23 passing and two touchdowns, including the game-winning touchdown pass to Sarratt on a 49-yard connection with 1:28 left in the fourth quarter in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27).
- In Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20), Mendoza had a 21-for-23 passing day with 267 yards and five passing touchdowns. His .910 (21-for-23) completion percentage put him at No. 3 on the game completion percentage charts just a week after setting the program record.
- Mendoza went 19-of-20 passing for 270 yards and five touchdowns to go along with a rushing score in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12). His .950 (19-for-20) completion percentage set the program's single-game record, topping **Peyton Ramsey's** mark against Eastern Illinois (13-14; .929) in 2019.
- Mendoza's six touchdowns accounted for are tied for the most in a single-game in program history with **Kurtis Rourke** (2024, Purdue), **Tre Roberson** (2013, Purdue) **Levron Williams** (2001, at Wisconsin), and **Bob Hoernschemeyer** (1943; Nebraska).

- In Fernando's Indiana debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30), he threw for 193 yards on 18-of-31 passing and had 34 yards rushing with a rushing touchdown.
- In 2024, he completed 265-of-386 of his passes for 3,004 yards, 16 touchdowns with 87 rushes for 105 yards and two rushing scores over the course of his 11 starts before missing the last week due to illness.
- It was just the ninth 3,000-yard passing season in Cal history. He finished top-10 on Cal's single-season passing charts in total offense (No. 7; 3,109 yards), passing efficiency (No. 8; 144.59) and yards passing (No. 9; 3,004 yards).
- Mendoza finished his Cal career as the all-time leader in completion percentage (.664) and tied for No. 7 in 250-yard passing games (10), equaling the marks of Gale Gilbert (10; 1980-84) and Aaron Rodgers (10; 2003-04) in career 250-yard passing games at Cal.
- The 2023 season featured Mendoza earning the starting gig in the final eight games of the season. He threw for 1,708 yards on 153-of-243 passing attempts with 14 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. Mendoza also charted 48 rushes for 92 yards and two touchdowns.
- In Mendoza's career, he has completed 629-of-922 passing attempts for 7,470 yards with 62 touchdowns. Additionally, he has run for 440 career yards and 10 rushing scores while also catching one pass for a 15-yard touchdown.
- **Alberto Mendoza** had a 58-yard rush and threw a 65-yard touchdown pass to **Davion Chandler** in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28).
- Mendoza had a 53-yard rush and threw a 6-yard touchdown to **Jonathan Brady** in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).
- He had his first career rushing touchdown on a 4-yard score in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25).
- Mendoza charted 104 yards passing and two touchdowns in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).
- He threw his first career touchdown pass on a 6-yard connection to **Charlie Becker** in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He served as the No. 3 quarterback for Indiana in 2024 and made his collegiate debut against Western Illinois in Week 2 (9/6).

• **John Miller** is in his second season coaching the Indiana running backs in 2025. Prior to Indiana, he coached the same position at James Madison for three seasons (2021-23).

• Miller's work with the running backs in 2024 made for an instant success. The Indiana running backs combined for 37 rushing scores which tied for the most in a season in program history.

• Indiana has produced back-to-back 2,000-yard rushing seasons for the first time since 2013-15. With one more rushing score, IU will match the same 2013-15 time frame with back-to-back seasons of 25-plus rushing touchdowns.

• Indiana's 312 yards rushing in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20) marked four-straight 300-yard rushing efforts for the first time in program history. It marked the longest Power 4 stretch since Baylor in 2017.

• With five rushing scores in Week 11 at Penn State (11/8), Indiana has recorded multiple rushing scores in 20 of 25 games since the start of 2024.

• The 309 yards rushing in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) was the team's first 300-yard effort against an FBS team since 2016 (411 yards vs. Maryland).

• **Kaelon Black** had his first career multi-rushing touchdown game when he ran for two scores in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28). Black has scored a touchdown in three out of the last four games.

• He scored a 31-yard rushing touchdown as part of his first 100-yard rushing game as a Hoosier with 110 yards on 14 carries in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).

• He went for 64 yards rushing on 10 carries and had a 29-yard touchdown in Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18).

• Black had a 40-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter of Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20). He totaled 89 yards rushing on 10 carries.

• In Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30), Black had 92 yards rushing and a touchdown.

• Black joined IU in 2024 after four years at James Madison (2020-23). He has registered 51 appearances with 16 starts over the course of his career.

• In 2024, Black appeared in all 13 games and logged 251 yards rushing on 46 attempts with two touchdowns. He recorded his first touchdown as a Hoosier in Week 4 against Charlotte (9/21).

• In 2023, Black made 12 starts and appeared in all 13 games at James Madison, logging 637 yards rushing with one touchdown and 254 receiving yards and four touchdown receptions.

• He owns four career 100-yard rushing games and has produced 2,880 career all-purpose yards and 20 touchdowns (14 rushing, 6 receiving).

• **Roman Hemby** is the one of two active FBS players with 3,000 yards rushing and 1,000-yards receiving in his career. He owns 4,574 all-purpose yards (3,213 rushing, 1,074 receiving, 287 kickoff return) and has scored 33 career touchdowns (28 rushing, 5 receiving).

• His 82-yard rushing score in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28) was the longest by a Hoosier since **Tevin Coleman** vs. Ohio State in 2014 and ties for the 10th longest rush in program history. Hemby totaled 152 yards on the ground against Purdue.

• He had 88 yards rushing and a touchdown in a return to his alma mater in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).

• He logged his sixth multi-rushing touchdown game and seventh multi-touchdown game of his career when he rushed for two scores in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25).

• Hemby ran for two touchdowns in Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11).

• He logged 86 yards rushing and one reception for 5 yards in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27) after 102 all-purpose yards (65 rushing; 37 receiving) in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20).

• He totaled 111 yards on the ground in his IU debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).

• Hemby is the first IU running back to top the 100-yard mark in their IU debut since **Jordan Howard** ran for 145 yards against Southern Illinois to open the 2015 season.

• In 2024, at Maryland he started in all 12 games and totaled 607 yards rushing on 134 attempts and six touchdowns. He also logged 273 yards receiving on 40 receptions with one touchdown.

• Notched his first career game with both a rushing and receiving touchdown in Week 5 at Indiana (9/28).

• Hemby is a two-time honorable mention All-Big Ten (2022 & 2023).

• Redshirt freshman **Khobie Martin** has appeared in all 12 games in 2025 with two 100-yard rushing games and six touchdowns.

• He posted 80 yards rushing on 11 carries with a 6-yard touchdown run in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).

• Martin logged back-to-back weeks with over 100 yards rushing and multiple scores when he logged 107 yards and two touchdowns in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20).

• In Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12), Martin had his first 100-yard rushing game and multi-touchdown game when he charted 109 yards on 11 carries and two scores.

• Martin appeared in two games of the 2024 season and logged 14 carries for 73 yards on the ground. In his Hoosier debut in Week 2 of 2024 against Western Illinois (9/6), he had a 31-yard rush.

• UAB transfer **Lee Beebe Jr.** posted 90 yards rushing with a touchdown in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), before he suffered a season-ending injury in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).

• He made his Indiana debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) and had 73 yards rushing on 11 attempts.

• Beebe Jr. spent the first three years of his career at UAB (2022-24) with 24 games played and 10 starts.

• In 2024, Beebe Jr. appeared in all 12 games and made 10 starts en route to being named third-team All-American Athletic Conference.

• Beebe Jr. has accumulated 1,844 career all-purpose yards (1,485 rushing, 324 receiving, 34 kickoff return, 1 fumble return) and totaled 13 career touchdowns (12 rushing, 1 receiving).

• **Solomon Vanhorse** is in his eighth season of college football, beginning his career back in 2018. He is one of three eighth-year players in the FBS in 2025. Vanhorse has made 62 career appearances with nine starts.

• In Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois, Vanhorse registered his first rushing attempts of the season, charting 27 yards rushing on four carries.

• In his first year at Indiana in 2024, Vanhorse appeared in all 13 games, primarily on special teams where he served as a primary kick returner. He returned five kickoffs for a total of 102 yards.

• True freshman **Sean Cuono** made his Hoosier debut in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12) with two carries for 17 yards.

• The duo is one of three active FBS pairs with 19-plus career receiving touchdowns (SMU & Houston).

• Sarratt made his first appearance back from injury in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28) after getting injured in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1). His 17-yard touchdown reception against the Boilermakers pushed his season total to 11 and tied for No. 3 on the single-season charts.

• In Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11), Sarratt caught the go-ahead touchdown to put Indiana up 27-20 with 6:23 remaining in the game and registered his 13th career 100-yard receiving game with 121 yards on eight catches.

• In Week 5 at Iowa (9/27), Sarratt pulled in the game-winning touchdown reception on a 49-yard connection with **Fernando Mendoza** with 1:28 left in the fourth quarter. He logged 156 yards receiving on seven catches.

• The Week 4 win over No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20) featured Sarratt going for two touchdowns with 92 yards on nine receptions.

• In Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), Sarratt posted a career-high-tying three receiving touchdowns for the first time since 2023 (at Coastal Carolina). He had nine catches for 97 yards in the win.

In 2024, Sarratt started all 13 games with 957 yards receiving on 53 receptions and eight touchdowns. His performance earned him third-team All-Big Ten from the conference coaches and media and second-team All-Big Ten by the Associated Press.

• Sarratt owns 13 career 100-yard receiving games (6 at Indiana; 6 at JMU; 1 at SFU) and has posted multiple receiving touchdowns in 10 games (5 at Indiana; 5 at JMU).

• After starting his tenure at JMU on the third unit, Sarratt had a breakout sophomore season in 2023 to earn first-team All-Sun Belt. Sarratt played at Saint Francis (Pa.) as a true freshman in 2022 and was tabbed as a FCS Freshman All-America and first-team All-Northeast Conference.

• **Omar Cooper Jr.**'s 43-yard touchdown reception in Week 14 at Purdue put him at 11 season scores and into a tie for No. 3 on the program's season charts. His touchdown in Week 12 against Wisconsin (11/15) gave him the 10th double-digit touchdown season by a Hoosier wide receiver.

• In Week 11 at Penn State (11/8), Cooper Jr. caught the game-winning touchdown reception on a 7-yard throw from **Fernando Mendoza** with 36 seconds remaining to put Indiana up 27-24.

• He charted his fourth 100-yard receiving game with 115 on eight catches and a 48-yard touchdown in Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18).

• Cooper Jr.'s 14-yard touchdown reception in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27) marked three consecutive weeks (Week 3-5) with a receiving touchdown and four-straight weeks with a score (Week 2-5).

• Cooper Jr. went for 10 catches, 207 yards receiving and four touchdowns in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12). It was the first multi-touchdown game of his career and tied the school record for most receiving scores in a single game (4) with **James Hardy** (Michigan State, 2006).

• The 24 points scored tied for No. 3 on the single-game scoring charts and tied for the most points scored since **Anthony Thompson** posted 32 against Northwestern in 1989.

• His performance marked the ninth 200-yard receiving game in program history and sit No. 7 on the single-game charts. The 207 yards are the most in a game since **Ty Fryfogle** (218) at Ohio State in 2020. His 10-catch effort is the first double-digit catch game since Jaylin Lucas (10) in 2023 versus Louisville.

• He had a 75-yard rush for a touchdown in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). It tied for the longest touchdown run by an IU wide receiver since at least 1996 (**Shane Wynn**; Michigan State, 2014) and was the longest rushing touchdown by a non-running back since 2014 (**Zander Diamond**; Ohio State).

• Senior **E.J. Williams Jr.** had his first-career multi-touchdown game with two scores on five catches and 109 yards receiving in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25). His second touchdown was a 62-yard catch and run.

• He scored on an 8-yard touchdown reception in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6) for his first touchdown as a Hoosier and his first since 2020 (vs. Notre Dame) while at Clemson.

• Williams Jr. is in his third year in Bloomington (2023-25) after spending the first three at Clemson (2020-22). He initially entered the transfer portal after four appearances in 2024 before electing to come back to IU.

• **Charlie Becker** logged 100-plus yards receiving in back-to-back weeks in Week 12 against Wisconsin when he went for 108 yards and a 31-yard touchdown. Becker had 118 yards receiving on seven receptions in Week 11 at Penn State (11/8).

• He hauled in a 52-yard reception in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1), after he had two catches for 35 yards in his first career start in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25).

• Becker had a 6-yard touchdown reception from **Alberto Mendoza** for his first career receiving touchdown in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).

• Becker appeared in 12 games as a true freshman in 2024, seeing time mostly on special teams. He logged 123 special teams snaps (46 kickoff return, 21 kickoff coverage, 53 punt return).

• In his collegiate debut in Week 2 against Western Illinois (9/6), he scored his first career touchdown on a 3-yard rush in the fourth quarter.

• Indiana added transfer receiver **Jonathan Brady** in the spring window from California where he teamed with **Fernando Mendoza**.

• His 34 punt return yards in Week 12 against Wisconsin (11/15) moved him into sole possession of No. 6 in the program's single-season charts with 323. He passed **Myles Price** (289; 2024) and trails **Thomas Lewis** (342; 1993) for a spot in the top 5.

• Brady had a 6-yard touchdown reception from **Alberto Mendoza** in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).

• Brady went for two receiving touchdowns on three catches for 27 yards in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).

• He scored IU's first touchdown of the season on a 91-yard punt return in the first quarter in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30), which is tied for the fourth-longest punt return in program history and the longest since **Lance Bennett**'s program-record 94-yarder 2004 against Michigan State.

• The punt return touchdown was the first for IU since **D.J. Matthews Jr.** returned one 81 yards against Idaho (9/11/21).

• With 108 total punt return yards, Brady moved into No. 6 on the single-game charts and the most since **J-Shun Harris** (100) in 2018.

• In 2024, Brady appeared in all 13 games for Cal with 24 starts and caught 36 passes for 386 yards and three touchdowns. Prior to Cal, Brady spent his first two years (2022-23) at New Mexico where he saw time in 28 games with 21 starts.

• He owns two career 100-yard receiving games (2; 2023).

• Freshman **Davion Chandler** had his first catch on a 65-yard touchdown connection from **Alberto Mendoza** in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28).

- Sixth-year senior **Riley Nowakowski** owns a catch in 10 off 12 games and has caught a touchdown in two games.
- He charted 65 yards receiving and a 21-yard touchdown in Week 12 against Wisconsin (11/15).
- Nowakowski had a 29-yard reception in the fourth quarter on the game-winning touchdown drive in Week 11 at Penn State (11/8).
- He went for 54 yards receiving on three grabs in Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18).
- Lone catch was a 43-yard touchdown reception in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20) on a second quarter tight end screen.
- He scored his first touchdown as a Hoosier on a 1-yard rush in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6). It was his first career rushing attempt.
- He caught two passes for 15 yards in his Hoosier debut in in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Including his time at IU and his five years at Wisconsin (2020-24), Nowakowski has appeared in 52 career games with 23 starts.
- He started in nine of 12 games at Wisconsin in 2024 and caught 11 passes for 73 yards.
- In 2023, he made his first collegiate start against Ohio State (10/28) and caught his first career touchdown pass at Minnesota (11/25).
- He joined Wisconsin as a linebacker and went on to play that position and fullback before moving to tight end in 2023.

- **Holden Staes** joined IU for his senior season after spending 2024 at Tennessee and his first two collegiate seasons at Notre Dame (2022-23). Over the course of his career, Staes has appeared in 47 games with 14 starts.
- Staes scored on a 2-yard touchdown reception in Week 12 against Wisconsin (11/15).
- He caught his first touchdown as a Hoosier on an 18-yard reception in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).
- Staes made one catch for 4 yards in his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30)
- In his lone season at Tennessee, Staes appeared in all 13 games with three starts and caught 15 passes for 131 receiving yards.
- **James Bomba** is the lone returner from the tight end unit and is in his fifth and final season in Bloomington. He has appeared in 41 games with 10 starts.

- Back for year three to lead the offensive line in Bloomington, **Bob Bostad** is continuing his progress with the unit as the lone holdover from Indiana's coaching staff in 2023.
- Bostad tutored 11 All-Americans over two stints at Wisconsin. That included eight on the offensive line, one tight end and two linebackers to earn All-America honors.
- The Indiana offensive line has been named a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award in back-to-back seasons (2024 & 2025).
- With 355 yards rushing in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28), Indiana posted its program-record sixth game of the season with 300-plus yards rushing.
- The Hoosiers totaled 312 yards rushing in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20) to mark four-straight 300-yard rushing games for the first time in program history. It marked the longest Power 4 stretch since Baylor in 2017.
- In Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12), the offensive line protected for 680 yards of total offense, good for No. 3 in a single game since at least 1950 and marked the eighth game of the **Curt Cignetti** era with 500-plus yards of total offense. It is the second-most yards Indiana has gained under Cignetti.
- Outland Trophy semifinalist **Carter Smith** has started 37-straight games at left tackle since Week 1 of 2023.
- Smith ranks as the No. 2-graded offensive lineman in the Power 4 per Pro Football Focus (90.0).
- His 2024 season earned him honorable mention All-Big Ten from the conference media and was part of an offensive line that was named a semifinalist for the Joe Moore Award.
- **Pat Coogan** quickly emerged as Indiana's starting center and made his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30). Dating back to his time at Notre Dame (2021-24), Coogan has appeared in 42 career games with 38 starts.
- He helped lead Notre Dame to a national championship game appearance in 2024 as the team's starting center in the final 13 games of the season after an injury to Ashton Craig versus Purdue (9/14) in Week 3.
- He started all 13 games at left guard in 2023 and made his first collegiate appearance against Boston College in 2022.

- **Bray Lynch** is the third returning starter from the 2024 Indiana offensive line that earned semifinalist honors for the Joe Moore Award. Since becoming the team's starter at right guard at the start of 2024, Lynch has started every game at the position since.
- **Kahlil Benson** returns to Indiana after one season at Colorado in 2024. Benson spent the previous four seasons at IU (2020-23) where he played in 25 games with 17 starts.
- Benson has started at right tackle in 10 of 12 games since returning to Bloomington.
- During his lone season in Boulder, Benson made nine appearances with four starts while battling injury and missing three games.
- **Drew Evans** returns from Indiana's stellar 2024 offensive line for his redshirt junior season. Evans started at left guard for the first eight games of 2025 before missing three-straight games in Weeks 10-14.
- Evans had nine starts in 2024 before suffering a season-ending injury prior to Week 11 against Michigan (11/9). He returned for his first game back in Week 1 of 2025 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Prior to nine starts in 2024, Evans did not see any game action in 2022 at Wisconsin or 2023 after transferring to at Indiana.
- **Zen Michalski** started at left guard in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1) to relieve an injured Drew Evans and started at right tackle in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28).
- He spent time on special teams for Indiana in Weeks 1-2 before making his first start as a Hoosier at right tackle in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12). He made his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Michalski, an Indiana native, returned to his home state after spending the first four years of his career at Ohio State (2021-24). He appeared in 29 career games with one start during his time in Columbus.
- Michalski made his first collegiate start against Nebraska (10/26) in 2024 before getting injured and missing the final nine games of the season.
- Coogan (Notre Dame) and Michalski (Ohio State) faced off in the 2025 College Football Playoff National Championship.
- **Adedamola Ajani** made his first three career starts in Weeks 11-14. Ajani has filled in at left guard for an injured **Drew Evans**.

- Senior **Aiden Fisher** has a career-high 7.0 tackles for loss in 2025, despite missing nearly two full games due to injury in the first quarter of Week 9 versus UCLA (10/25) and was out for Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).

- He posted his first career pick-6 on his first interception as a Hoosier and second of his career in against UCLA. He picked off Nico Iamaleava on the game's second play and returned it 25 yards to open the scoring.
- Fisher logged nine tackles and 1.5 tackles for loss in Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18).
- He was the Hoosiers' top tackler again in Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11) with 13 stops and 1.5 sacks.
- Fisher led the team with nine stops in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27).
- He notched seven stops with 2.5 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- He led the Big Ten in tackles a year ago with 118 stops, the most by a Hoosier in a single season since **TeGray Scales** (126) in 2016.

- He has played in 47 career games with 35 starts, including starting in 24 games of his 25 games at Indiana, missing just one game due to injury.

- Rolijah Hardy** emerged as the Hoosiers' second starting linebacker in 2025 after a breakout 2024 season where he played in all 13 games with four starts as a true freshman.

- Defensive tackles coach **Pat Kuntz** and defensive ends coach **Buddha Williams** are in their second seasons leading the defensive line for IU.
- Redshirt senior **Mikail Kamara** returned to Bloomington after leading all of FBS in total pressures (73) in 2024. Kamara owns at least one tackle in 47 of 49 career games and at least 0.5 tackle for loss in 35 games.
- Kamara is tied for No. 1 in the Big Ten and ranks tied for No. 10 in the Power 4 in total pressures (47) in 2025 (min. 400 snaps).
- In his first season as a Hoosier in 2024, Kamara had 15.0 tackles for loss and 10.0 sacks. His sack total ranks tied for No. 5 on the single season list at IU.
- In 2024, he garnered second-team All-America from The Athletic, third-team All-America per the Association Press, named a finalist for the Lott IMPACT Trophy and tabbed a semifinalist for the Bednarik Award.
- Kamara was also a consensus first-team All-Big Ten pick by the conference's coaches, media and Associated Press.
- He was named the Bednarik National Defensive Player of the Week and Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week after 4.5 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks at Michigan State (11/2) in Week 10.
- His younger brother **Amari Kamara** is a true freshman and linebacker for the Hoosiers.
- He notched five total tackles with 2.0 tackles for loss and 1.0 sacks in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
- Tyrique Tucker** was a key rotational piece to the defensive line in 2024 and has started every game of 2025. He has a tackle for loss in eight of 12 games.
- Tucker is the No. 20 graded defensive interior in the Power 4 per Pro Football Focus (77.5) which is No. 3 in the Big Ten among interiors with at least 300 snaps.
- He posted a team-high 2.5 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25).
- Tucker logged 2.0 sacks on four total tackles in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20).
- In Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12) notched 1.5 tackles for loss and had a solo sack.
- Tucker spent his first two seasons at James Madison (2022-23) where he redshirted in 2022 and then made five starts over 13 appearances in 2023.

- Mario Landino** has 24 career appearances, missing just one game of his career due to an injury in 2024
- He posted 1.0 sack and four tackles in his first career start in Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11).
- He notched 2.0 sacks on four total tackles in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20) after Landino logged 1.5 tackles for loss and had a solo sack in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).
- He registered his first career sack on a combined effort with Tucker in Week 9 of 2024 against Washington (10/26) when they brought down Will Rogers in the third quarter.
- His first-career appearance came in Week 1 of 2024 against FIU when he combined on a tackle for loss with Tucker for his first career tackle.
- Stephen Daley's** 1.0 tackles for loss in his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) set the tone for him leading the Big Ten with 18.0 on the season, a total that ranks tied for No. 8 in IU single season history.

- He had a team-best 2.0 sacks to go along with three tackles in Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18).
- Daley charted four tackles and 1.0 tackles for loss in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27) after his first sack as a Hoosier as part of a 2.0 tackles for loss day in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).
- He appeared in 39 career games including 24 starts at Kent State (2022-24). In 2024, Daley logged 9.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, one forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

- Despite only playing in the first six games of the season, **Kellan Wyatt** logged 27 tackles, 8.0 tackles for loss and 2.5 sacks before getting injured in Week 8 versus Michigan State (10/18).
- He had three-straight games with at least 0.5 sack when he notched 1.5 sacks at Oregon (10/11), 1.5 at Iowa (9/27) and 2.0 versus No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20).

- **Rod Ojong** is in his second year coaching the cornerbacks in Bloomington after five years coaching defensive backs at multiple schools: Austin Peay (2018), Furman (2019), Buffalo (2021-22) and Charlotte (2023).
 - In 2020, he was a quality control assistant for a Georgia team that won the Peach Bowl and posted an 8-2 record.
- **D'Angelo Ponds** has logged 0.5 tackle for loss in four games of the 2025 season and is the No. 3 rated coverage cornerback in the Power 4 per Pro Football Focus (90.2) and No. 1 in the Big Ten (min. 350 snaps).
 - In Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18), Ponds posted nine stops, 0.5 tackle for loss and a pass breakup.
 - Ponds blocked his second career punt in the first quarter and returned it 11 yards for a touchdown in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20). It was the program's first blocked punt return for a touchdown since **Javon Swinton** against Idaho in 2021.
 - He opened his second season at Indiana with his sixth-career interception, four tackles and 1.0 tackle for loss in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
 - He garnered 2024 second-team All-America honors from The Athletic, CBS Sports, ESPN, Football Writers Association of American, Phil Steele and USA Today while also earning first-team All-Big Ten from the conference coaches, media and Associated Press.
 - In Week 9 of 2024 against Washington (10/26), Ponds logged his first career multi-interception game when he caught two picks, one that he returned 67 yards for a touchdown.
 - Ponds has started 34 games of his 37 career appearances spanning his time at James Madison (2023) and Indiana (2024-present).
 - Ponds was tabbed as a Freshman All-American by the FWAA , a semifinalist for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year award and notched second-team All-Sun Belt honors as a freshman.

- **Jamari Sharpe** is the longest tenured Hoosier in the cornerback room with 36 appearances and 24 starts, and has started opposite Ponds in every week of the 2025 season.
 - He notched forced fumbles in back-to-back weeks, forcing one in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1) and in Week 11 at Penn State (11/8).
 - Sharpe had the first forced fumble of his career and second fumble recovery in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6).
 - Sharpe played in nine games with three starts in 2024 after enjoying a breakout 2023 season. After playing just three games in his redshirt season of 2022, Sharpe appeared in all 12 games and made nine starts in 2023.
 - His first career interception came in Week 12 of the 2023 season against Michigan State on a third-quarter pick of Katin Houser.
- **Ryland Gandy's** first start as a Hoosier came in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27), when he had five tackles and 1.0 tackles for loss.
 - Gandy made his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30), after three years at Pitt (2022-24) with 29 appearances.
 - All 13 of his starts as a Panther were made in 2024 with his first career start against Kent State (8/31) in the season opener.
- **Amariyun Knighten** had his first tackle as a Hoosier in Week 3 against Indiana State (9/12).
 - Knighten made his Hoosier debut in Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), after 25 career games with 14 starts over three seasons at Northern Illinois (2022-24).

- **Ola Adams** is back for his second year coaching Indiana's safeties and defensive backs in 2024.
- In 2023, Adams was a defensive analyst and analytics coordinator at Penn State. Prior to 2023, Adams coached defensive backs across the collegiate and professional ranks.
- Adams coached at Villanova from 2015-21, tutoring the defensive backs and serving as the team's defensive coordinator from 2019-21. He also was defensive backs assistant for the Denver Broncos in 2022.
- **Amare Ferrell** has started every game since 2024 (25 games) and has made 37 career appearances while charting 97 tackles, eight interceptions, 7.0 tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks during his time in Bloomington.
- Ferrell picked off Ryan Browne for his fourth interception of the season in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28) on their second offensive play of the game.
- He had an interception in the first quarter of Week 5 at Iowa (9/27). His pick of Mark Gronowski set up Indiana for a touchdown on its first offensive series of the game.
- He intercepted Ethan Hampton in the fourth quarter of Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20), and made the first of three IU interceptions in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30).
- Ferrell posted his first career multi-interception game at Michigan State (11/2) in 2024 with a pair of second-quarter picks.
- In his first career start in Week 1 against FIU (8/31) in 2024, Ferrell grabbed his first career interception and posted two tackles.
- He was one of seven true freshmen in the program to debut in 2023 and the only not to redshirt (played in all 12 games).
- **Louis Moore** had his eighth career interception and fifth this season in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1). The interception puts him in a tie at No. 16 on the program's career list and in a tie at No. 8 on the single season list.
- His five interceptions in 2025 are tied for No. 3 in the national lead, he trails Jakari Foster (Louisiana Tech) with seven.
- He logged his fifth career double-digit tackle game with 11 stops and 0.5 tackle for loss in Week 8 against Michigan State (10/18).
- He had eight tackles and a second-consecutive week with an interception in Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11).
- Moore logged seven tackles and an interception in the Week 5 win at Iowa (9/27), after he led the team with six tackles, including five solo stops in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20).
- He posted back-to-back weeks with seven tackles and an interception in Weeks 1-2 against Old Dominion (8/30) and Kennesaw State (9/6). He also notched 1.5 tackles for loss in Week 2.

- Moore transferred back to Indiana after spending the 2024 season at Ole Miss. He previous played for IU in the 2022-23 seasons and before that was a standout at Navarro Community College (2020-21).
- He has appeared in 47 career games with 22 starts over his five years with five career double-digit tackle games (1, 2025; 1, 2024; 3, 2023).
- At Ole Miss, Moore appeared in 11 games with two starts and logged 36 tackles with 2.0 tackles for loss. In Week 3 at Wake Forest (9/14) he made his first career fumble recovery.
- In his first stint at Indiana, Moore made 10 starts in 24 appearances and was the Hoosiers' second-leading tackler (82 stops) in 2023.
- In Week 4 against Akron (9/23), Moore had the first multi-interception game of his career when he hauled in two, which included a pick-6 in the third quarter.
- **Devan Boykin** logged seven stops and his second fumble recovery in four games when he picked up Stephen Daley's forced fumble in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28).
- He had his second interception in four games in Week 12 against Wisconsin (11/15).
- Boykin forced and recovered a fumble for a 32-yard touchdown return on his strip of Malik Washington in the third quarter for his first touchdown as a Hoosier in Week 10 at Maryland (11/1).
- He had his first interception as a Hoosier and seven tackles in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25).
- In Week 2 against Kennesaw State (9/6), Boykin logged four stops and 1.0 tackles for loss.
- Boykin made one tackle and the start in his IU debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30). He missed the 2024 season due to injury and redshirted while at NC State.
- In his five seasons with NC State (2020-24), Boykin appeared in 45 career games with 20 starts. He made his first career start as a true freshman in 2020 at North Carolina.
- In 2023 against Notre Dame (9/9), he logged his first career double-digit tackle game when he had 11 stops. He also forced his first career fumble against North Carolina to end the regular season (11/25).

- He made his collegiate debzut in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25) on special teams and logged his first three career tackles.
- Baldwin Jr. was a consensus four-star prospect per ESPN, 247Sports, Rivals and On3 and a top-100 national recruit by 247Sports and On3, after a prep career at St. Frances Academy.
- The Maryland native was named an Under Armour All-American and is considered the No. 8 highest rated recruit in Indiana football history per 247Sports.
- **Bryson Bonds** is the longest-tenured Hoosier on the roster, spending all six of his collegiate seasons with IU. Bonds has appeared in 48 career games with one start, but suffered a season-ending injury against Old Dominion.

- **Grant Cain** is in his second season at the helm of Indiana's special teams unit and his seventh under **Curt Cignetti**, previously leading the same unit for James Madison from 2019-23.
- Cain's unit earned an 88.7 grade by PFF in the 2024 season which graded out at No. 4 nationally and No. 2 in the Big Ten.
- In his time leading special teams units, his pupils have notched three All-America honors and 13 all-conference selections.
- **Nico Radicic** has 26 career appearances at IU and has been the field goal specialist in every game since the start of the 2024 season (25 games).
- Radicic's field goal versus the Badgers improved his active streak to 15-straight made field goals, tying the program record set by **Austin Starr** (15; 2007).
- His streak of consecutive made field goals ranks tied for No. 2 in the FBS behind Tate Sandell (Oklahoma) who has made 22 consecutive field goals.

- His eight total points in Week 14 at Purdue (11/28) pushed his season total to 109 and just shy of No. 5 on the single-season charts, in **Austin Starr** (111; 2007). He accounts for just the sixth 100-point season in IU history and third for a kicker.
- The eight points improved his career total to 213. He trails **James Hardy** (216; 2005-07) for the program's No. 11 spot.
- Both of Radicic's field goals in Week 5 at Iowa (9/27) tied the game. He converted from 46 yards at half (10-10) and from 44 yards in the fourth quarter (13-13).
- His 4-for-4 day on extra points at Purdue pushed his season total to 70 which breaks his own school record of 69 (2024) for the single-season mark.
- The four extra points improved his career total to 141 and is No. 3 on the career list. He trails **Griffin Oakes** (147; 2014-17) for No. 2.
- He is just the third Hoosier to make 100 consecutive extra points as he joined **Mitch Ewald** (100-for-100 before first miss; 2010-13) and **Pete Stoyanovich** (107-for-107; 1985-88).
- Radicic holds eight of the top-10 single-game extra points made marks with No. 1 (11; Western Illinois, 2024), T-No. 2 (10; Indiana State, 2023), T-No. 4 (9; Illinois, 2025), (9; Purdue, 2024), T-No. 6 (8; Purdue, 2025), (8; UCLA, 2025), (8; Kennesaw State, 2025), (8; Nebraska, 2024).
- He finished No. 2 in FBS in extra points made (69) and posted an FBS-best 5.3 extra points made per game in 2024. He broke Indiana's single-season record for extra points made last year and it only took him nine games to claim the record.
- He is 24-of-25 (.960) on field goal attempts and 141-of-141 (1.000) on extra point attempts in his collegiate career.
- A five-star prospect per Kohl's Kicking, Radicic was rated the No. 3 kicker nationally by 247Sports and the No. 4 kicking prospect by ESPN in the class of 2023. He was selected to participate in the 2023 Army All-American Bowl.
- **Brendan Franke** arrived to Bloomington in 2025 and assumed the kickoff specialist duties for the Hoosiers.
- In Week 7 at No. 3/2 Oregon (10/11), Franke made his first career field goal when he tied the IU program record for longest field goal with a 58-yarder in the closing seconds of the first half to put Indiana ahead, 13-10. The kick was the longest made field goal by a Hoosier in a road or neutral-site game and also set an Autzen Stadium record.
- Franke has logged a touchback on 46 of his 51 career kickoffs (.902) in his time as a Hoosier, and has a career touchback rate of .739 (193-of-261).
- He has appeared in 57 career games. He played in 12 games at Texas State (2024), four at Georgia Southern (2023) and redshirted, and 24 over two seasons at Nebraska (2021-22). He saw time in nine games in one season at Morningside (Iowa) College (2020).

- **Mitch McCarthy** is the only punter on the roster and is in his first season as a Hoosier. McCarthy spent three seasons at UCF (2022-24) prior to IU where he played his first snaps of American Football.
- McCarthy, 27, is the fourth oldest player in FBS Football with the only players older being 29 or 30 years-old.
- In Week 5 at Iowa (9/27), McCarthy punted for the first time since his Week 1 injury. McCarthy logged four punts for 155 yards and had two punts land inside the Iowa 20-yard line.
- He had one punt for 47 yards in his Hoosier debut in Week 1 against Old Dominion (8/30) before exiting the game with injury which caused him to miss Weeks 2-3.
- He has notched 46 punts inside the 20-yard line and and has averaged 42.5 yards per punt on 139 career punts.
- The Australia native spent one year at Village Christian High School in California and participated in basketball before he was selected as the No. 7 overall pick in the 2016 Australian Rules Football Rookie Draft by Collingwood and then trained with ProKick Australia in the fall of 2021.
- **Quinn Warren** took over on kickoff duties starting in Week 9 against UCLA (10/25) in relief of Franke's injury. He has had 33 kickoffs with 14 touchbacks in four games.
- He punted in Weeks 1-4 and got three of his seven punts inside the 10-yard line.
- Both punts in Week 4 against No. 9/8 Illinois (9/20) went for 52 yards with his second being pinned at the Illinois 2-yard line. He also pinned Old Dominion (8/30) inside the 5 in Week 1.
- Warren appeared in seven games in 2024 as a kickoff specialist due to injuries in the special teams unit.
- Long snapper **Mark Langston** is in second season with the IU program and has started every game at long snapper since coming to Bloomington.
- His strong performance in the 2024 season earned him preseason recognition, being named to the Mannelly Award watch list which honors the best long snapper in the FBS.
- Langston has started in every game (25 games) since joining the Hoosiers in 2024 and has appeared in 47 collegiate games. The first 22 of those came at Georgia Southern. He did not see any game action at Kennesaw State.
- He is in his seventh and final collegiate season after spending two years at Kennesaw State (2019-20) and three years at Georgia Southern (2021-23) where he missed the entire 2023 season due to an ACL injury.

INDIANA RESURGENCE

- Cignetti has immediately elevated the Indiana program with a program-record 11 victories in his first season at the helm and a College Football Playoff appearance.
- After helping the Hoosiers to an 11-2 record and an 8-1 mark in the Big Ten – both win totals are program-bests – he was named the Hayes-Schembechler Big Ten Coach of the Year (coaches) and Dave McClain Coach of the Year (media) from the conference office.
- The accolades didn't stop there, as he was named the Home Depot National Coach of the Year at the annual ESPN Home Depot Awards and added national coaching honors from The Sporting News, FWAA, Associate Press, Walter Camp Football Foundation and AFCA.
- Cignetti is the first-ever Division I head coach to start 10-0 in consecutive seasons at different schools. (James Madison, 2023; Indiana, 2024).
- One of six Big Ten coaches that started their Big Ten tenures with 10-0 overall records in the AP Poll Era (since 1936): Cignetti (2024), Ryan Day (Ohio State, 2018-19), Urban Meyer (Ohio State, 2012), Earle Bruce (Ohio State, 1979), Bennie Oosterbaan (Michigan, 1948-49) and Carroll Widdoes (Ohio State, 1944-45).
- Cignetti engineered a 7.5-game improvement from Indiana's 2023 to 2024 season, a number that sits as the fourth-best improvement by a first-year head coach since at least 1996 and is the best by a Power 4 head coach since 2012 (Gus Malzahn, Auburn; 8 games).
- He is the only Indiana head coach to begin his head coaching tenure 4-0 or better and his 11 wins set the mark for wins by a first-year IU head coach, previously held by James M. Sheldon (8; 1905).
- A win over FIU in Week 1, Cignetti became the 15th coach in program history to win the first game of his Indiana tenure and the first to do since Bill Lynch in 2007. He was the eighth IU frontman to start 2-0 and fourth to begin 3-0.
- Joins Clyde B. Smith (1948) as the only first-year Indiana head coaches to win their first game at IU and their initial Big Ten game.
- The 77 points in the Western Illinois set the single-game program record for points in a game and the 66 points against Purdue in a 66-0 shutout are the most by an IU team in a Big Ten game. The previous marks were 76 (Franklin College, 1901) and 63 (at Wisconsin, 2001).
- The 29-point margin of victory at UCLA was Indiana's largest in a Big Ten road game since defeating Wisconsin (Oct. 6), 63-32, in 2001.
- Indiana's offense has set program records for total touchdowns (70), offensive touchdowns scored (68), and rushing touchdowns (tied; 37).
- Bryant Haines and Mike Shanahan have been with Cignetti for the long haul. Both took jobs at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and were elevated to coordinator for the first time at James Madison under Cignetti.
- Along with the six assistant coaches, Cignetti saw 13 key contributors from his previous stop join the IU program via the transfer portal in 2024.

SUCCESS AT JAMES MADISON

- Prior to becoming Indiana's head coach in December 2023, Cignetti amassed massive success at James Madison in his five-year tenure in Harrisonburg.
- Cignetti's Dukes teams went 52-9 from 2019-23, including a 19-4 mark in 2022 and 2023, JMU's first two years as an FBS program.
- 2023 was nothing short of magical for James Madison as the team went 11-1, had a 7-1 mark in the Sun Belt while winning the eastern division and spent time in the national rankings.
- Cignetti became the first coach to lead his team into the Top 25 during a program's first year of transition from FCS to FBS.
- In 2023, JMU clinched the school's first bowl bid, back-to-back Sun Belt East titles, and a Top-25 ranking for six-straight weeks.
- In Week Two (9/9), James Madison went on the road and defeated the flagship school of the state, the University of Virginia, in dramatic fashion, 36-35.
- The outstanding season earned Cignetti 2023 Sun Belt Coach of the Year.
- In 2022, JMU went 8-3 overall with a 6-2 mark in conference play to finish tied for first in the Sun Belt East Division. The Dukes opened with a 5-0 record, earning its Top-25 nod for the first time.
- Prior to FBS football, Cignetti led his JMU teams to equal levels of success in the Colonial Athletic Association and the FCS from 2019-21.
- The Dukes clinched three-consecutive CAA championships and playoff appearances, a berth in the 2019 FCS national championship game, and FCS semifinal appearances in 2020 and 2021.
- In his five years at James Madison, Cignetti's teams went 31-4 in conference play.
- Cignetti led James Madison to a 14-2 record and the national title appearance in his first campaign in Harrisonburg in 2019. JMU reeled off 14 consecutive wins, went 8-0 in league play, and notched eight nationally-ranked wins, with three inside the Top 10.
- The Dukes went 7-1 and reached the FCS semifinals in 2020, and finished 12-2 with a conference championship and semifinal appearance in their final FCS season in 2021.

- A 2019 Eddie Robinson Award finalist, Cignetti mentored 27 Dukes to All-America status. At the conference level, he tutored one Player of the Year, three Offensive Players of the Year, two Defensive Players of the Year, and one Special Teams Player of the Year.
- James Madison totaled 72 all-conference honorees, including 2023 Sun Belt Player of the Year quarterback Jordan McCloud and 2023 Defensive Player of the Year defensive lineman Jalen Green. Additionally, 17 Dukes carded spots on the All-Sun Belt team.

RAPID TURNAROUND AT ELON

- Prior to his stint at James Madison, Cignetti amassed a 14-9 record in two years at Elon (2017-18), a program that went 12-45 in the previous five campaigns.
- The Phoenix qualified for the FCS Playoffs in both seasons, just the second and third playoff berths in program history (2009).
- Cignetti led Elon to a six-win improvement in 2017, going 8-4 and finishing second in the CAA at 6-2. The Phoenix defeated four ranked opponents and returned to the national rankings for the first time since 2010.
- His squad also went on an eight-game winning streak, the first from an Elon football team since 2009.
- He was named Colonial Athletic Association Coach of the Year as the Phoenix reached the postseason and finished 20th in the national rankings.
- The great success also put him in line for a fourth-place finish in the voting for the Eddie Robinson Award.
- Elon secured a second-straight playoff appearance in 2018, with the ninth-ranked Phoenix knocking off No. 2 James Madison for the program's first-ever win over an FCS Top-5 opponent. The victory also snapped the Dukes' 22-game conference winning streak.

THE IUP DAYS

- Cignetti's inaugural head-coaching opportunity came at Indiana University of Pennsylvania from 2011-16.
- The IUP job was personally special for Cignetti as that is where his father, Frank Cignetti Sr., patrolled the sidelines for 20 years as head coach and played his college football.
- His father, Frank, is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame after playing at IUP and compiling a coaching record of 199-77-1 at West Virginia (1976-79) and IUP (1986-2005).
- The field at IUP is named in his honor (Frank Cignetti Field @ George P. Miller Stadium).
- Curt Cignetti went 53-17 with three playoff appearances and four Top 25s in six campaigns as the IUP head coach.
- The Crimson Hawks touted a 33-11 ledger in the Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference after a 4-10 two-year stretch prior to his arrival. Cignetti was 4-3 in the playoffs and had a final ranking as high as 12th (2016).

BEFORE HE WAS A HEAD COACH

- Cignetti's 27-year tenure as an FBS assistant coach featured a spot on Nick Saban's first coaching staff at Alabama. He served as wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator (2007-10).
- Saban coached under Frank Cignetti before later employing Curt at Alabama.
- The Crimson Tide went 12-2 in 2008, the same year Cignetti helped corral the nation's No. 1 recruiting class. Alabama followed with an undefeated national championship season in 2009, and a 10-win campaign in 2010.
- He joined the Crimson Tide after a seven-year stint as recruiting coordinator (2000-06), tight ends coach (2000-02), and quarterbacks coach (2003-04) at North Carolina State.
- The Wolfpack reached five bowl games, including the 2002 Gator Bowl squad that set a program record with 11 victories.
- His first run as a recruiting coordinator came at Pitt from (1993-99), where he also coached tight ends and quarterbacks at various times under College Football Hall of Fame head coach Johnny Majors.
- Cignetti started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pitt (1983-84) and was part of its Fiesta Bowl team his first year. • He mentored quarterbacks and receivers at Davidson in 1985, and he oversaw the quarterbacks at Rice (1986-88) and Temple (1989-92).
- Cignetti graduated from West Virginia in 1982, where he lettered as a quarterback and earned his bachelor's degree in business administration.
